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Ah₂ another fresh year.

The slate is clean, and Old Man Time has exited stage right as Freshness of Innocent Newborn enters stage left. New Year's Eve services are a rare event as 2015 ends and 2016 rolls in, but there is a wisdom in marking the end of the old and beginning of the new with spiritual reflection.

I propose that the Bible text for New Year's Eve is "God is making all things new", Revelation 21:5. The spiritual grace is forgiveness and reconciliation. The liturgical words to live into are "anyone who is in Christ is a new creation; the old life has gone; a new life has begun!"

I vote for Alfred Tennyson, "Ring Out Wild Bells" as the best classical poem for the beginning of a new year. Here's an excerpt:

Ring out false pride in place and blood, the civic slander and the spite; Ring in the love of truth and right, ring in the common love of good. Ring in the valiant souls and free, the larger heart, the kindlier hand; Ring out the sad-ness of the land, ring in the Christ that is to be.

And for the best traditional hymn (no longer in our Presbyterian hymnal), "How Beautiful The March of Days". Here's the second verse:

O'er white expanses, sparkling pure, the radiant morns unfold; the solemn splendours of the night burn brighter through the cold; life mounts in every throbbing vein, love deepens round the hearth, and clearer sounds the angel hymn, "Good will and peace on earth."

And finally, a powerful and necessary prayer. As a congregation we will be leaning into the theme of "Peace, Shalom, Salaam" as we prepare for and move into the Season of Lent. This prayer, attributed to Francis of Assisi, can be prayed by anyone of any religion. Let us pray this prayer, and allow ourselves to be molded by its words.

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:
where there is hatred, let me sow love;
where there is injury, pardon;
where there is doubt, faith;
where there is despair, hope;
where there is darkness, light;
where there is sadness, joy.
O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek
to be consoled as to console,
to be understood as to understand,
to be loved as to love.
For it is in giving that we receive,
it is in pardoning that we are pardoned,
it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.



Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. (Matthew 5:9)





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
WORSHIP CENTERS



MIDTIME MINISTRIES

his Winter-Spring, FPC is placing an emphasis on Peace; in our sermon topics, Lenten Small groups, along with a few other special gatherings and activities. Learning to forgive and be forgiven is one of the most essential parts in becoming a Person of Peace. Admitting our failures, seeking to repair and restore relationships, and accepting forgiveness are necessary practices to live as healthy and whole people.



In his book *Forgiveness: Finding Peace Though Letting Go*, bestselling author Adam Hamilton explores forgiveness in our relationships with God, with our spouses or romantic interests, with our parents and siblings, and with others in our lives. If you desire to experience the freedom that comes through forgiveness, regardless if you are the one that has been hurt or the one that caused the hurt, this study is for you.

This 4-session group study will meet Sunday **January 17, 24, 31** & **February 7** from 10a-10:50a in the Michigan Room. We will watch a 10-12 minute video each week in which Adam Hamilton, using stories and Scripture, presents and expands upon key points from the book. We will spend the remaining time discussing the topic. It is recommended that you purchase the book (we will have a limited number to sell) though the study is designed so that all can fully participate either way. Our facilitators for this study are Bill & Janet Haines. No need to pre-register; just show up on January 17.

NON-VIOLENT COMMUNICATION

As part of our ongoing program of promoting Peace at FPC, the Watchers is presenting a program on Non-Violent Communication on Sunday, January 10th at 10a. It will be presented by Theresa F. Latini, Associate Dean of Diversity and Cultural Competency and Professor of Practical Theology and Pastoral Care at Western Theological Seminary. Professor Latini is a Graduate of Princeton Seminary and an ordained Presbyterian Pastor. Among other publications, she is the author of *The Church and the Crisis of Community*. In a variety of settings, Theresa has sought to cultivate communities of compassion and care in response to God's ongoing ministry of listening, healing and reconciliation. KITCHEN FIXIN' campaign

After a long hiatus of inactivity, the kitchen is coming back. The re-build plans have been completed and work will begin shortly. Our goal is to have the refurbished kitchen ready for the Easter Breakfast in the Spring. A significant reason for the long hiatus has been sorting out the various and sometimes conflicting requirements and regulations of the multiple regulatory entities. Thanks to the diligence of Elder Jon Kreple, everything has been sorted out, remodel plans developed, bids received and authorized.

All of this comes at a price. The total cost is estimated at between \$100,000 and \$125,000. Some funding will come from the Capital Campaign. For the remainder we are initiating the *Kitchen Fixin*' campaign. If you've been "itchin" about the absence of a kitchen (who hasn't?) this is your opportunity to make a contribution large or small to the *Kitchen Fixin*' campaign.

Please note: There are some areas that we did not receive any pledges for so in mid-January we will provide everyone with a list of these opportunities and give you another chance to make a pledge for one of these opportunities.

he earliest mention of something like a per capita apportionment dates back to the 1700s. In the mid 1800s, a "plan of mileage" was adopted by the General Assembly to defray the expenses of commissioners attending General Assembly meetings so that everyone could be present to participate regardless of distance or financial resources. Over time, per capita has been used to fund "ecclesiastical and administrative" functions that are shared by the whole church. In 1995, the following definition was developed:

Per capita is an opportunity for all communicant members of the Presbyterian church through the mid councils to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the cost of coordination and evaluation of mission; and of performing ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions that identify a Reformed Church, while at the same time strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians (GA Minutes, Part I, 1995).

In essence, per capita is a set amount of money (apportionment) per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Every Presbyterian shares in the benefit of the PC(USA)'s system of government, so every Presbyterian is asked to share the expenses associated with coordinating and performing the functions of that system.

Why per capita? Per capita exists as a way for all Presbyterians to share costs that belong to the whole church, to give meaning to the interdependent nature Presbyterian polity. Per capita is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It exists to allow the whole church to share equitably in those things that make us Presbyterian: our theological identity, our connectedness, our system of mid councils that allow elders and ministers together to discern the mind of Christ, our ecumenical connections that make us part of the church universal, our core structures that keep us together as a church, our call to work for full participation in decision making

Per capita allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

FPC per capita apportionment for 2016 is \$25.37. Your apportionment envelope is the first envelope in your offering envelope box. Please contact office@fpcholland.org or 616-392-9002 if you have any questions or have misplaced your envelope. Thank you!

On Friday, December 4, ten members of FPC visited and observed the prayer time at the Masjid At-Tawheed Islamic Center in Grand Rapids. We were welcomed to the Center and remained through the 1:30PM prayer time held every Friday at the Mosque. Following the congregation's prayers, Pastor Linda was introduced and invited to speak. It was a moving experience to observe the reaction of the members of Masjid At-Tawheed as they heard Linda's words. She has asked me to share with you my reflections included in an email I sent to her the morning after our visit.

December 5, 2015

Thank you for speaking to the congregation of Masjid At-Tawheed on behalf of the community of First Presbyterian Church.

The words you shared spoke of hope for understanding and the unity of our faiths in seeking peace. You reminded all of us that God is with us always.

Our visit was timely in light of the Paris attacks and now the equally horrible event in California. We listened intently to Imam Morsy's words about **justice**, followed by your words of **hope**. It may not have been planned that way but it was very effective.

I want to share with you our observation as you were introduced and began to speak. Sitting with the women of Masjid At-Tawheed we were able to watch their reaction as you were introduced. Many were preparing to leave; they stopped, aligned with their sisters and listened to your words. Others who were already out of the prayer room returned in order to hear your comments. When you finished the women made their way to where we were sitting, hands outstretched and thanked us for coming to their mosque. It was a beautiful experience. The sincerity in their eyes and their handshakes were real. Kris and I left the mosque through the front entrance where many of the men had remained, talking among themselves. Two men approached, thanking us for visiting and for remaining thru their prayers. Your assuring words of hope spoke volumes, Linda.

And a timely FYI for you:

Last night on the 11:00 PM news ... TV 8 aired a news segment from Masjid At-Tawheed. Following the announcement out of California confirming the gun people were in fact aligned with ISIS and the killings were determined to be a terrorist attack, TV 8 was looking for a reaction from the Grand Rapids Muslim community. They reached out to the Imam Morsy and with a film crew visited the Islamic Center last evening, intending a film -at-11 type news story. The Imam refuted the terrorist acts, referencing his comments on the teachings of the Quran. However, an interview with a member of the congregation indicted he was feeling negative reactions from some people in the community. He did not say he was fearful but conscious of the impact terrorist attacks are having on people of the Islamic faith. I could not help but think *if only TV 8 could know efforts at understanding and peace had occurred just a few hours earlier and report that message, too.* Thank you.
