first FRUITS

The idea of "first fruits giving" comes from the Old Testament. In Deuteronomy 26, quoting from the Message Bible, the Israelites were told to "take some of all the first fruits of what you grow in the land that God, your God is giving you, put them in a basket and go to the place, God, your God, sets apart for you to worship him." It refers to the first and best portion of the harvest. By giving God the first fruits, Israel acknowledged that everything comes from God and it was a way of expressing trust in God's provision. Just as God provided the first fruits, so God would provide the rest of the crops that were needed.

From Proverbs 3: 9-10, "Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing, and your vats will brim over with new wine."

There are no New Testament admonitions binding Christians to give first fruits or even a tithe. Jesus however, talked about choosing between God and money as the Lord of our lives. God asks for our money because he wants our hearts and knows that when we offer our first fruits to God, our heart will follow. Giving a portion only from what we have leftover, robs us from the blessing of trusting God to supply our needs.

As we make our pledges this fall, be aware of God's call to give the first fruits of our harvest, whether it is our time, our love, our resources or our money. Our gifts to God are acts of love and gratitude. Trust God to provide adequately to meet all your needs.

INTRODUCING PASTOR HANY GAD BESHAY MIKHAIL FROM EGYPT

We are getting very excited about Pastor Hany's visit from October 14-November 4! Allow me to introduce you to Pastor Hany:

Family: Pastor Hany has been married to Nariman since 1991. They have two sons, George (23) and Ephraim (19). Nariman, George and Ephraim play music at church while Pastor Hany sticks to singing. They have all dedicated their lives to serving Jesus our Savior.

Languages Spoken: Arabic and English

Educational Background: Pastor Hany graduated from high school in 1983. He then received a bachelor degree from Cairo Evangelical Theological Seminary in 1988.

Church: Helwa, the village where Pastor Hany lives and serves has a population of 50,000. Approximately 10,000 people in Helwa are Christian. Helwa Presbyterian Church was established in 1898, and serves God among all (Christian and Muslims). 90 families (150 Members) attend Helwa Presbyterian Church. Pastor Hany is the senior pastor. They are currently looking for another pastor to assist Past Hany.

In what ways do the witness and service of Helwa Presbyterian Church influence the life of the community and nation?

- 1. Changing people's lives for better through knowing Jesus Christ
- 2. Helping people in their needs through health care and microloans
- 3. Offering public schools and nursery, Christian counseling and mental health services
- 4. Creating media and publishing like TV programs, magazines, books, etc.
- 5. Facilitating sports events and youth gatherings
- 6. Offering training and educational centers

What can we learn from Pastor Hany's background, experience and current involvements? Pastor Hany says, "We are the eastern nations which were born and lived on the same land which Jesus and prophets were born, the same mountains that heard the voice of our Lord. That means we have a very good background about Biblical information and can provide a huge amount of understanding of historical and Biblical facts. Also we easily understand and deal with Islamic traditions without any infections or any arguments."

David Walter needs our active participation as he coordinates Pastor Hany's daily schedule. Please consider sharing a few hours of your life by having Pastor Hany over for dinner, taking him to the beach or inviting him to another favorite activity. If you are

A MESSAGE FROM **TERESA**

I was sitting in the M&M Café last Sunday afternoon anxiously anticipating the beginning of our first confirmation class. As I sat at the table with my carefully written notes and neat stacks of papers to share in front of me, I could not stop thinking, "what am I missing? I must be missing something..."

I know many of our youth often feel the same with their activities and responsibilities, so I decided to try out a "practice of presence" with our confirmands called the L.I.V.E. Method, which Dori Grinenko Baker describes in her book *The Barefoot Way*. Listen to the stories around you; Immerse yourself in a response; View it wider by finding God's movement in the story; and Explore what pieces of the story you can take with you.

With our youth programmatic year officially underway, I have found this practice helpful not just in building community with our confirmation class, but as a personal practice at the end of the day. The art of slowing down and paying attention has helped me find a renewed sense of joy in God's movement through our youth. Between our fall lock-in, Mid-Time Ministry class, confirmation discussions and youth group gatherings, there is much to celebrate! I am grateful for God's spirit at work through all that we've done so far this year, and am anticipating, in a non-anxious way, all that is to come.


