aster, It's a Season!

The Easter eggs may all be eaten and the Easter bunny decorations tucked back in the basement, but it is still Easter! In fact it is Easter for seven weeks, 50 days right up until Pentecost, this year falling on May 15. The Worship Center students know it is still Easter because they see the choir and pastors wearing white stoles, see white candles and white paraments on the Communion Table and notice the white cloth in the pulpit. While it may seem strange, we will even sing Easter hymns for the next 7 weeks. Doesn't it make sense? Resurrection takes some time to sink in. It's a unexpected, alarming, and glorious reality which is too grand for one day to hold.

Eastertide is a season for resurrection to percolate in us, to work its power in us, and to remind us that the gift of new life is a gift to be shared.

A 20th Century Christian saint, Clarence Jordon, founder of the Koinonia Farms and author of *The Cotton Patch* Gospel, writes:

"The proof that God raised Jesus from the dead is not the empty tomb, but the full hearts of his transformed disciples. The crowning evidence that he lives is not a vacant grave, but a spirit-filled fellowship. Not a rolled-away stone, but a carried-away church."

When challenged about her belief in resurrection, asking if she had ever raised someone from the dead, Roman Catholic writer Megan McKenna said yes: every time she brings hope into a situation, every time she brings joy that shatters despair, every time she forgives others and gives them back dignity, every time she listens to others and affirms them and their life, every time she speaks the truth in public, every time she confronts injustice, that yes, she brings people back from the dead.

Wendell Berry at the end of his essay "Manifesto: A Mad Farmer Liberation Front" implores us to "Practice resurrection".

This Eastertide, watch for resurrection, practice resurrection, spread resurrection. The world needs it.
So do you.
Let's become a carried-away church.

### A MESSAGE FROM SCOTT

"Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?"
- Mary Oliver from "The Summer Day"

Eighteen years ago my dad experienced kidney failure as a result of his diabetes. It was difficult to see the toll that being diabetic took on my father's body before he reached his 50th birthday. He was on dialysis for over a year before one of his sisters learned that she was a match and donated one of her kidneys. That kidney lasted about 16 years and just under 2 years ago my dad needed a second transplant. He again was on dialysis until February of 2015, when Zach Olson, the pastor of my parents' church in Grand Rapids, stepped forward and donated one of his kidneys to my dad. Thanks to Pastor Zach, my dad has resumed an active retired life that includes hanging out in Holland with his grandkids every Wednesday afternoon.

Due to the fact that my dad and I do not have the same blood type I was ineligible to donate one of my kidneys to him. I wished that I could have helped my dad as a donor, but being a part of my dad's journey prompted me to ask myself when/if I would consider donating a kidney. Well, I have made my decision and I have decided to be an altruistic kidney donor. Surgery is scheduled for Monday, April 18, at Mercy Health Saint Mary's Kidney Transplant Center in Grand Rapids.

I am incredibly grateful for the support of Jill and my extended family to proceed as a donor. Pastor Linda, the personnel committee and session have also given me their blessing and approval to proceed as a kidney donor. I now write to you to request your support and prayers for this unique and privileged adventure of which I get to be a part. I will be gone for approximately 4 weeks, with the goal of easing back into things as I have the energy to do so. I am told that it takes about 4 months before one's full energy returns due to the fact that the remaining kidney is slowly growing to pick up the work that was previously done by two kidneys.

A few years ago during a sermon, Jill shared the quote from Mary Oliver that is at the opening of this letter. It has stuck with me and it is a quote that I regularly ponder. The gift of life is wild and precious, and the older I get the more aware I am of the variety of ways that others have generously invested in me, helping to shape who I am and who I am becoming. I try not to take this for granted as I discover deeper joy and meaning in life when I take steps towards sharing a little of what I have been given with others. Thank you for your support and I greatly appreciate your prayers for me and the recipient for a speedy recovery.



**Sunday, April 24** is also observed as Blue Sunday - Day of Prayer for Abused Children. The day when churches take time in their service to pray for the victims of child abuse and for those who rescue them. We pray because they shouldn't have to pray alone.

"Whoever receives one little child like this in my name receives me." - Matthew 18:5

Did you know there are over 3 million confirmed cases of child abuse in our nation annually? Did you know that of the 1640 child deaths from child abuse that most were under the age of 3? This is an appropriate day to hold our annual training and review of the Child and Youth Protection Policy. The training is for those working with nursery/childcare; Worship Centers; Children and Youth Choir; and also our Youth. Please bring a copy of the front and back of your driver's license. If you are unable to attend on Sunday April 24, please contact me to set up a time that is more convenient for you. The Policy has been adopted by the Session and is also required by our insurance liability carrier. Feel free to join us if you are simply interested in knowing more about this policy. Everyone is welcome.

# MINISTRY HIGHLIGHT OF THE MONTH

# Building & Business Council

a.k.a. B&B



### Who is on the B&B Council?

Chris Olney, Liz Bristol, Ray Harrison, Jan Peterson, Janet Magennis, Jon Kreple, Larry Grinwis, Ted Oyler. Pastor Linda Knieriemen also attends council meetings.

### How does ministry get done in the B&B Council?

Business and Building ministry is divided into 2 parts: Building and Stewardship.

This month we are focusing on the Building part of the council's work. The Building portion is concerned with maintaining the facility and grounds.

The council references the Strategic Plan for direction and priorities for major projects and improvements. Annually, the B&B Council coordinates a walk through and inspection of the church building and grounds. Maintenance projects are identified during this annual walk through, or as concerns are brought to the attention of the council.

### What exciting thing did the B&B Council do in the last 12 months?

The most exciting project is the Kitchen redesign/remodel. It is currently underway and should be completed in late spring. Jon Kreple has agreed to stay on as an "emeritus" council member to see this project through. Please make sure to thank him for his hard work and dedication to this project.

#### What ministry projects are you planning in the coming 6 months?

We are planning to upgrade and maintain existing structures of the building, that we identified as minor problems during the last annual walk-through, such as:

- A new entry door is needed on the 28th street side of the building.
- New flooring in the nursery school entrance.
- A new wooden storage box for the fire extinguisher in the M&M café.
- Window treatments for two east facing rooms, which currently do not have them.



# How do committee members engage in your ministries?

Committee members often volunteer to lead a specific task or project. Tasks vary widely in size and can range from a major renovation project to helping choose an item of décor. The B&B Council provides hands on opportunities for those who want to help with grounds or maintenance.

### How can others be involved?

There is plenty of work to be done to improve the facilities and grounds. Those who would like to volunteer to help with projects such as painting, carpentry, or outdoor grounds keeping should let members of the council know. If we can use talents from within the congregation, it can save money that would otherwise be spent hiring outside labor.

# KITCHEN FIXIN'

As FPC continues to move forward in fulfilling our goals set out in the strategic plan to renovate the kitchen to meet all codes, requirements and future plans of our spiritual and actual needs, you may be wondering...

### Why does fixin' the kitchen cost so much?

You are in luck! Jon Kreple, B&B Council member and lead Kitchen Fixin' Project Manager, is here to explain the various costs that are included in this not-so-inexpensive job. Put on your hard hat; you are in for a treat!

The misconceptions of the cost estimates are not easily understood unless the many aspects of the project are considered. The majority of expenses are going towards paying for the...

ARCHITECT: The design associated with a church structure like ours requires a licensed architect to prepare detailed design drawings and other documents.

GENERAL CONTRACTOR: Since the size of the project was fairly extensive it was decided to use a general contractor for project management and subcontractor coordination. A project manager was assigned with overall responsibility to assure a complete architectural review of all design documents. He contacts equipment suppliers to evaluate the equipment specifications, solicits cost estimates from the various subcontractors and develops a schedule for the various steps of the work. The project manager was also required to obtain all of the building permits and coordinate the various inspections as the project proceeded.

CONSTRUCTION LABOR: Construction trades labor that have taken part in this project include carpenters, electricians, plumbers, drywall installers, heating, ventilating and air

conditioning (HVAC) ductwork fabricators, painters, flooring installers, and the equipment suppliers' installation specialists that will also perform start-up service and testing to assure that it all works as it's designed.

CODE COMPLIANCE: We elected to meet all code requirements so as to have a kitchen that could be used for any purpose within the church or to the community beyond, if such a need was identified. New code requirements have to be met so that adds additional cost and equipment. Code requirements for the preschool also had to be factored in. Previous code violations from the State of Michigan Department of Human Services were addressed to assure that no future violations were received and any upgrades were made part of the goals of the renovations.


**DEMOLITION:** Before starting construction, the kitchen had to be deconstructed through demolition. From removing kitchen cabinets to replacing the tile floor; cutting concrete to replacing drains. This project is more extensive than meets the eye.

APPLIANCES: Commercial grade kitchen appliances have been specified for our project. A new six burner stove and a large freestanding double oven will sit beneath a large stainless steel exhaust hood. A new dishwasher, with racks for dirty dishes, will sit on a soiled dish table which includes a high pressure spray nozzle and a garbage disposer in the built in stainless steel sink and counter top. The soiled dish racks slide into the dishwasher and exit out the opposite side onto another stainless steel "clean" dish table.

Custom stainless steel counter tops, and stainless steel backsplash (to protect the walls from over spray) have been fabricated to the unique shape of the kitchen where walls intersect at an angle.



Our family safely arrived on Thursday, March 17th. They have already been enrolled in English as a Second Language classes. We have ample volunteers to provide transportation and visitation (thank you so much to all who have volunteered). The family is living in temporary housing until April 1st. They will then move into their apartment.

We need the help and support of the whole congregation for many months to be successful at supporting this family as they transition to living here.


