Ummer Reading!

It's that time again when longer summer days lounging either at the beach or on the patio provide longer hours for reading. The first three books I've recently read and recommend to you:

In 11/22/63, Stephen King explores if history could be changed if time travel were possible. It's a different kind of suspenseful tale than we usually get from King. A New York Times reviewer calls is "a meditation on memory, love, loss, free will and necessity." I call it a compelling, provocative read.

Lab Girl. Paleobotaníst (I know, look ít up!) Hope Jahren, ín alternating chapters, compares her sometimes maníc, sometimes mundane career as a

researcher with detailed descriptions of the plant world, exploring relationships with quirky, faithful colleagues along the way. I won't ever look at a tree the same again.

Sacred Ground, Pluralism, Prejudice and the Promise of America, by Eboo Patel. A supplement to the DVD series Mid-Time Ministries offered this spring. A valuable look at reframing and leading positive interfaith relationships.

On my summer "to read" list:

Brother, I'm Dying, by Edwidge Danticat. The "Big Read" for Holland this fall.

The Humans of New York, by Brandon Stanton. Photographs and stories of New Yorkers from a 32 year old blogger. Recommended by one of our grandsons.

Between the World and Me. Written in the form of a letter to his son, National Book Award winner Ta-Nehisi Coates helps him come to terms with racism.

A Great Reckoning, by Louise Penny. Due to be released on August 30, I'll have to wait until the end of the summer for this 12th book in the Three Pines mystery series.

David and I are vacationing in New England this July, so I'm going to dust off some of the 19th Century New England writers. I still have my first copy of **Little Women**. Maybe I'll enjoy a few pages at Walden Pond.

Buddha and Jesus and The Long Road Turns to Joy, a Guide to Walking Meditation. For devotional reading, Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh is accessible and inspiring.

Finally, to prepare our fall focus on Jesus' parables, (may I call this "Falling for Parables" without being booed?) I'm returning to three gems by Episcopalian priest and scholar Robert Farrar Capon, **The Parables of Grace**. **The Parables of the Kingdom** *and* **the Parables of Judgment**. His style is warm while academic, pithy while sufficiently comprehensive. Expect me to mention him in sermons this September!

As always, thanks to those of you who make recommendations of books I'd otherwise never pick up, and an encouragement to let me know what you are reading and enjoying!



As part of our church technology migration and network improvement, the guest wi-fi network has been separated from the internal church network. This should increase security and prevent any accidental data loss.

This means that even if you have logged into the church wi-fi in the past, you will likely have to log in again using one of the following three network names:

FPC / FPC 2 / FPC Basement

"2.4g" or "5g" may also appear after the network name (example "FPC 2.4g"). Your device will choose which it likes better.

All three network names will require the same password:

"surfwithgrace"






What ministry events is the Worship and the Arts Council planning in the coming 6 months?
