
Our final Summer of the Arts guest will be the Dutcher Snedeker Jazz Combo. Come to worship on **August 21** for a different kind of musical journey.

### Report from the PCUSA Family Reunion (aka General Assembly)



recently read that every church is both a family and an institution. Certainly that is true among churches in our denomination, the PCUSA. Every other year the families come together to worship, learn, renew friendships, celebrate mission relationships, and conduct the business of the church. What happens at the General Assembly does impact the lives of individual congregations, so here are a few highlights for those of you who, like me, weren't on hand for the PCUSA family reunion and business meeting!

Following the 12-year tenure of Gradye Parsons as Stated Clerk of the denomination (the highest elected office in the PCUSA), the Assembly confirmed the election of Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, the first African American to hold this position.

For the first time in its history, the General Assembly elected co-moderators rather than a Moderator and a Vice-Moderator. The Rev. Denise Anderson, at 37 the youngest ever to hold the office, and The Rev. Jan Edmiston, a pastor currently serving as an executive for the Presbytery of Chicago, will share this two-year position.

With Allen Boesak (one of its co-authors) present, the Assembly gave final approval to include the Belhar Confession in our Book of Confessions. Arising out of apartheid, this theological statement written by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in South Africa is a repudiation of church and cultural divisions based on class and race. It becomes the only voice in our Book of Confessions originating in the rapidly growing Global South.

A proposal to approve a complete revision of the Book of Worship passed, streamlining its organization, simplifying its language and restrictions, and reducing the length, while also providing for a broad range of worship styles and cultural perspectives.

Commissioners decided against the denominational divestment from fossil fuel firms, electing instead to continuing its corporate engagement with energy companies as stock holders through the denomination's Mission Responsibility Investment Group.

The Assembly endorsed The Clergy Letter Project. This interfaith initiative I have participated in for several years avers that the "the timeless truths of the Bible and the discoveries of modern science may comfortably coexist"; that evolution is a "foundational scientific truth"; to treat it as "one theory among many" is to "deliberately embrace scientific ignorance."

And, making my heart sing, the commissioners voted to restore the previous nomenclature in the Book of Order. Church officers will once again be "Ministers of Word and Sacrament" and "Elders". The cumbersome and confusing "ruling elder" and "teaching elder" will be replaced at the next assembly in 2018 if a majority of the presbyteries concur with this year's action.

### A MESSAGE FROM SCOTT

### Truth or Half Truth?

One of the favorite segments when Jay Leno was still the host of *The Tonight Show* was "Jaywalking", where he would ask questions of random people on the street. On one occasion, he asked people to name one of the Ten Commandments. Many people responded with, "God helps those who help themselves." That is not one of the ten commandments, but a survey by the Barna Group, a Christian polling firm, found that better than eight in ten Americans did think "God helps those who help themselves" is in the Bible.

"This too shall pass", "Cleanliness is next to godliness", "Love the Sinner, Hate the Sin". Are these quotes from the Bible? Are they true? They are not found in the Bible, but they do contain some truth. It might be more accurate to label them half true, meaning there is some truth in each of them. These and many other similar phrases are often said and believed by Christians. Most often these phrases are used in an effort to provide encouragement or hope to others. We usually don't examine the source or the potential negative impact of believing in and repeating them until they cause us, or someone we say them to, confusion or hurt.

As a pastor, I have many opportunities to say helpful, hurtful and occasionally stupid things in response to someone sharing difficult, troubling or sad news. I am grateful that the words from James 1:19 that "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak," found their way into my mind and heart at an early age, which has helped me to listen first before offering a response. Let me be clearit is not that I am wise and only offer helpful responses; rather, it is by listening and waiting to respond that God brings to my mind the compassion and encouragement that God offers through me.

In worship on July 10 & 24, we will be exploring two half truths. It was the reading of the book *Half Truths*: God helps those who help themselves and other things the Bible doesn't say by Adam Hamilton that inspired me to choose this topic. This book has helped and challenged me to reflect on the things I believe and have said that were delivered as God's Truth, but actually caused confusion or hurt.

God often communicates truth, healing and love through people. When we have opportunities to speak words of truth, healing and love, it is my hope that we take the time to reflect and even research the source and potential impact of our words. Through this discipline, I am confident that God will continue to use our words in profound and positive ways. Whether or not you come to worship in July or read Adam Hamilton's book, may you

continue to be God's people whose words truly provide the hope and comfort that our families, community and world desperately long to hear.




### What exciting things did the Personnel Council do in the past year?
