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t was a hot summer evening several weeks ago when a candidate for an tawa County judgeship knocked on our door. We had a friendly exchange, he disclosed that he was the son-in-law of a pastor, and I in return sharing with him that I was a Presbyterian pastor. His immediate response was, "Then I hope that you will talk with your congregation about my candidacy." I replied, with a smile, that I most certainly would not, that pastors are prohibited from endorsing particular candidates for elected office. He backed off a bit, handed me his campaign literature and walked on to the neighbors' door. I remained stunned. For unrelated reasons, I didn't vote for him, but it did raise my awareness about a lack of understanding regarding national laws governing the relationship between partisan politics and pulpit pronouncements.

I was glad, therefore, to see on last week's Sentinel editorial page a piece from the Los Angeles Times explaining to readers about the 1954 "Johnson Law" prohibiting 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organizations (religious and secular) from direct participation in supporting or opposing any candidate for public office.

Not all pastors respect that law, and in so doing, run the risk of losing tax-exempt status for their organizations. Some politicians want the law repealed. Even if it were repealed, I wouldn't publically endorse a candidate, whether a local judge or a presidential candidate, because I applaud our founders' wisdom about boundaries between church and state. There is a time and place to speak, and there is a time and place to remain silent. I believe that makes sense not only because it's law, but because you don't want me in the voting booth with you!

But to those who would say the church should stay out of politics, I heartily disagree and simply point to the example of Jesus who early and often critiqued the Roman Empire. Like the Hebrew prophets before him, he dared to identify national practices which both created or failed to address matters of poverty, hunger and injustice.

One of my responsibilities as a pastor, theologian, and preacher is to study, pray and then speak, informed by scripture's proclamation into this particular society and circumstance. I do that from the pulpit, in Bible classes, in publications both secular and religious. I believe that the words of the Old Testament prophets and the words of Jesus hold wisdom that should influence your decisions in the voting booth, but I will not spell out a political party or candidate's name for you. That's up to the Holy Spirit.

Our PCUSA Brief Statement of Faith affirms our participation in public discourse and decision making:

"The Spirit gives us courage

to pray without ceasing,

to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior,

to unmask idolatries in Church and culture.

to hear the voices of peoples long silenced,

and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace."

Jesus' "saving work" was not only about souls, it was about societies.

This election season, DO work with others for justice, freedom and peace.

A MESSAGE FROM SCOTT

Lawns, Kidney and Family Update

Last summer I wrote about my adventures with an electric lawn mower and how I want to keep making steps that care for creation in my daily life. I need to start by confessing that I grew tired of mowing the lawn with the electric mower, so I gave it away and bought a neighbors' aging gas mower for \$40. I did not totally give up on my values as I am now in the process of killing my lawn so that I can plant Eco-Turf, a low maintenance Fescue mix sold by Michigan Wildflower Farm. Once this turf is established, it does not need to be watered, does not need fertilizers and grows slowly so only needs to be mowed one or two times a season. I know that I won't have the prize lawn on the block, but it will reduce our water usage and eliminate any lawn chemicals from entering the storm sewer. One of the main motivating factors in this decision was listening to presentations by Project Clarity whose goal is to remediate the water quality issues of Lake Macatawa and the Macatawa Watershed. Their website has several great ideas about water quality best management practices for homeowners, www.macatawaclarity.org.

I passed the 4 months post kidney donation mark and I am feeling great. Thank you FPC family for your ongoing love, care and support. Doctors say that most donors are back to full strength after 4 months, and I am grateful that this is true for me. The last week of July I also had the privilege of meeting the recipient of my kidney over ice tea at Panera. She is a 44 year old speech therapist in the Grand Rapids Public Schools and is doing wonderfully. She had been on kidney dialysis for over one year prior to the transplant and struggled to have the energy to work and complete daily tasks like grocery shopping. She has renewed energy to invest in her students, her church and activities with friends. It was wonderful and emotional for both of us to have this privilege of sharing our stories together in person.

Finally, as you all prepare for the transitions from summer to fall, I wanted to share a few updates about our family. Judah is entering the 2nd grade and Zoe is starting kindergarten, both at Black River. We will have kids at the same school on the same schedule for the first time, which is wonderful. Jill continues her role as interim associate pastor at First Presbyterian of Grand Haven. They are in the middle of their search for a Senior Pastor and when that position is hired, they will begin the search for the new associate pastor. She has invested one year already, and continues to enjoy the opportunity to support that church in their time of transition.

I look forward to the simple, significant and profound ways that we get to worship, serve and live together this fall as we begin a new season in the life of FPC Holland.







FOOD FOR THOUGHT: Film View & Discussion

2016/2017 Schedule

All are welcome to a film view and discussion led by Jack Hyde.

Food For Thought meets on the second Friday evening of each month at 7p in the Michigan Room.

Below is our film schedule from September 2016 - May 2017.

September - St. Vincent – (re-scheduled showing after last year's being snowed out). (2014) 102 min. Out of desperation, a single mom has to rely on neighbor Vincent, an alcoholic Vietnam vet with a pregnant prostitute for a girlfriend, to watch over her twelve-year- old son. The real Vincent is slowly revealed.

October – Suffragette (2015) 107 minutes - inspired by true events, about the women who were willing to lose everything in their fight for equality in early-20th- century Britain. Galvanized by outlaw fugitive Emmeline, Maud joins the U.K.'s growing Suffragette movement alongside women from all walks of life who sacrificed their jobs, homes, children — and even their lives — for the right to vote.

November - The Boy in the Striped Pajamas (2011) 94 minutes - A curious 8 year-old boy wanders off from his new home into the nearby woods where he discovers an unusual fence, behind which is a boy strangely dressed in "black-and-white pajamas". Bruno embarks in a most unusual friendship with the boy, one that proves both ordinary and remarkable, both inspiring and tragic.

January - The Woman in Gold (2015) 109 minutes - true story of one woman's journey to reclaim her heritage and seek justice. Sixty years after she fled Vienna during World War II, an elderly Jewish woman starts her journey to retrieve family possessions seized by the Nazis, among them Klimt's famous painting Portrait of Adele Bloch-Bauer I. The journey takes her all the way to the heart of the Austrian establishment and the U.S. Supreme Court and forces her to confront difficult truths about the past along the way.

February – The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel (2014) 124 minutes - a group of British retirees decide to "outsource" their retirement to less expensive and seemingly exotic India. Entired by advertisements for the newly restored Marigold Hotel and bolstered with visions of a life of leisure they arrive to find the palace a shell of its former self. They become transformed by their shared experiences discovering that life and love can begin again when you let go of the past.

March – Trumbo (2016) 125 minutes - In 1947, Dalton Trumbo was Hollywood's top screenwriter until he and other artists were jailed and blacklisted for their political beliefs. Trumbo recounts how Dalton used words and wit to win two Academy Awards and expose the absurdity and injustice of the blacklist which entangled everyone from gossip columnist Hedda Hopper to John Wayne, Kirk Douglas and Otto Preminger.

April – *Spotlight* (2016) 129 minutes - true story about the Pulitzer Prize-winning investigation that uncovered a scandal that rocked one of the world's oldest and most trusted institutions. Delving into allegations of child abuse within the local Archdiocese, a team of Boston Globe reporters exposes a decades-long cover-up that reaches the highest levels of Boston's religious, legal, and government establishment.

May - Young at Heart (2008) 104 minutes - a fun-loving senior citizens' choir called Young@Heart prepares for a show in their hometown that is only weeks away, they must learn a slate of new songs, ranging from James Brown to Coldplay. The chorus' tireless musical director leads the group through a series of hilariously chaotic rehearsals, proving that hard rock can be hard work— especially when you're hard of hearing! Climaxing in a triumphant performance that will leave you cheering, their inspiring story celebrates the unbreakable bonds of friendship and the life-affirming power of music!

WORSHIP AND THE ARTS COUNCIL

The Worship and the Arts Council would like to thank everyone in the congregation who participated in the worship service survey this summer. We would like to share the results of the survey.

We are happy to say that 159 members of the congregation participated either through the paper form or the online version. Of those, 111 were regular attenders of the 11:00 service and 43 from the 8:45 service. There were others who did not share a preference.

The focus of the survey was music, service times and worship style. We also asked whether a single service option would be a fit for First Presbyterian as well as the use of video to enhance the worship experience.

When asked about music there was an overwhelming preference for a blending of traditional and contemporary styles whether it be a hymn sung or from the choir selections. There was also a desire for an increase in special music, both instrumental and vocal.

The idea of one service for First Pres was split fairly evenly with 63 feeling two services were still of value and 61 thinking one service was sufficient and 33 non-committal.

We were also split on the idea of using video as a supplement to the worship service. Of those with an opinion, 77 responded favorably and 67 negatively.

As you can see, some of the areas will be easy to implement because there was an overwhelming desire on the part of those surveyed, but others were split fairly evenly. We will be making changes based on what we have heard from you. Some will be small and some not so small. We understand not all of the changes will be embraced by everyone, but we will try to create worship experiences that will utilize the survey as a tool to move forward. We want the congregation to feel the survey was indeed important to the committee.

FAITH & AMERICAN POLITICS



CARE CLOSET

Due to Good Samaritan Ministries having a budget deficit, and no longer being able to vet our clients, Care Closet is no longer in operation at First Reformed Church and First Presbyterian Church. In spite of the sadness this brings we have much to celebrate.

From 2000 - August 2016, our combined Care Closets have served 14,652 clients and nearly 43,000 family members. We have also, in partnership with Buen Pastor, been able to help nearly 140 migrant families. Each time we have sponsored a refugee family, we have also been able to supply them with needed items.

One of our greatest joys has been the wonderful partnership between First Reformed and FPC. Over 15 years, we have gotten to know each other, appreciate our different styles, and we have had nothing but the best cooperation. Our partnered neighborhood outreach has gone beyond Care Closet, allowing us to serve together on Habitat for Humanity projects as well.

Many people from both churches have made this mission possible, and for many this put a new face on the poor. Aline Miller has faithfully called clients every week for all operating Care Closets and come every second Thursday to help sign them in. Karen Bergstrom Roach, Paul and Nancy Heinemen, and Jan Zessin took their turns at shopping for the closet. Thanks to the diligent shoppers from both churches, we never lacked for supplies. And thanks to so many of you who donated products or wrote checks so we could buy in bulk. There is a long list of our congregation who lovingly helped to fill orders and showed our clients real care. Some of you were able to help only a few times and we appreciate that. Others like the following helped often and even asked us when they could work: Nancy West, Pat and Gary Smith, Mary Harrington, Juanna Jackson, Bob and Mary Jane Hitesman, Linda Clark, Liz Bristol, Lori Van Tubbergen, Bob Scholten, Mike and Sandy Updegraff, Eric and Sandy Peterson, Mary Blackall, Jim and Jackie Rozeboom, Nancy Stall, Larry and Judy Rouse, Lori and Ray Harrison, and Marilyn Rae.

Our most important celebration is the relationships that were built with clients. We saw many move from despair to joy, dependency to jobs and giving back. We have learned so much about sharing faith, love and concern.

FPC WELCOMES PASTOR HANY OF EGYPT

From October 14 - November 4, we have the unique privilege of hosting Hany of Nay Mazar, a Pastor in the Presbyterian Church of Egypt. He is participating in a program through the Synod of the Covenant, where each Fall the synod invites church leaders to spend three weeks in the United States. We are asked to provide for all of his housing, meals and transportation needs throughout his visit. The Outreach Council at FPC has committed \$1,500 to cover the expenses related to this program, which is the suggested financial commitment of a full supporting church.
