A MESSAGE FROM LINDA

What has been, and soon will be, on my bookshelf

WHAT YOUR PASTOR HAS BEEN READING:

• A Man Called Ove by Fredrik Backman. Last year I was introduced to this Swedish author's quirky characters and surprising plot lines with his book "My Grandmother Said to Tell You She's Sorry" so went back to this earlier book which has recently come out as a film.

- The Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern. Mystery? Fantasy? Science Fiction? Leave your need for rational behind and simply let yourself go into this marvelously told story of love.
- The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson. I needed the education in racism that this 640 page volume offers. Wilkerson follows the migration of three families from three locations in the south following the Great Depression to three different locations in the north in this extensively researched piece of historical journalism.
- Growing Up White: and Finding Myself in the Story of Race by Debby Irving. A humble memoir by a liberal white woman who thought she understood racism and discovered her own brand of racism. It hits close to home.
- Hillbilly Elegy: A memoir of a Family and Culture in Crisis by J.D. Vance. This was not the book I assumed it was!
 With neither judgment nor defensiveness Vance, former marine and graduate of Yale Law School writes about his childhood and early adulthood in a poor rustbelt town

WHAT YOUR PASTOR IS ABOUT TO READ:

- Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind by Yuval Noah Harari. David's been reading me excerpts from this Israeli historian who addresses the question: How did Homo Sapiens evolve from an unexceptional savannah-dwelling primate to become the dominant force on the planet, emerging as the lone survivor out of six distinct, competing hominid species?
- Glass Houses. My favorite mystery writer Louis Penney's newest book due out in August.
- Hallelujah Anyway: Rediscovering Mercy. Anne Lamott never gets old, always droll, irreverent and nontraditionally spiritual.
- Britt Marie W as Here by Fredrik Backman.
- Thirteen Ways of Looking by Colum McCann. I'm curious to explore McCann's first
 collection of short fiction. I've enjoyed his rich, poetic, and insightful look into the
 human condition.

INCOME AND EXPENSES AT FPC - 2017

Where are we? We adopted a balanced budget for 2017 of \$505,000. The income or giving side of this budget represented a 10% increase from the previous year's budget. The areas of expense increase in this year's budget are largely in Building & Business and Personnel. \$7233 in B&B largely reflecting increased costs of current operations. The added \$15,000 in the Personnel budget reflects increases for all staff and added hours for the combination of Publications Specialist and Administrative Assistant to get us closer to a total of 40 hours per week of administrative office staff time.

So, how are we doing? It's fairly normal for our giving in the early part of the calendar year to be a bit slow and then pick up as the year progresses. I'm pleased to report that this year - through April - our giving is significantly ahead of last year (by nearly 16%) and only \$2700 below our budget for the year to date. Total revenue is actually ahead of our budget by a modest amount (less than \$1000). Expenses so far are under budget and revenues exceed expenses by approximately \$2700. So we're in great shape!

Thanks be to God and to our members whose faith and generosity enable our ministries to flourish! May our First Fruits Stewardship practice continue to grow our ministries!

1 Corinthians 16:13-14

My brain froze a minute, thinking this was about adoption, and we looked at each other. Then I remembered that this is a Dutch pancake finished in the oven and dusted with powdered sugar. deBoer's calls them Klompen Cakes done on the grill."

Where does the money raised go? The First Presbyterian Preschool children will benefit by receiving tuition assistance through our service. Last year 8 partial scholarships were funded with an additional contribution from the Outreach council. WOW! Thank you to all who participated!
