I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now.

Philippians 1:3-5

We've all experienced greetings of warm embrace, and we also know the sting of an abrasive greeting. Greetings hold the potential to make or break a connection, particularly upon first meeting someone. Just think: two parties come together, unfamiliar and unsure, and then slap a greeting on top of it all and you find either a firm foundation or a "No, thank you."

Like the verse above, he often addressed his brothers and sisters in Christ with love, joy, peace,

Paul in the Fall

Confession: I've never been a fan of The Apostle Paul's letters.

The Gospels? Yes! The history and poetry of the Hebrew Scriptures? Absolutely! But even after an inspiring class in Romans taught by a tremendous seminary professor, I've preferred to read and preach from anything but Paul. Maybe you feel the same way.

But Paul's writings are part of our sacred scripture. God speaks to us through the words of the whole of scripture, not just what we "like", not just what we pick and choose. Thomas lefferson, supplied with razors and paste, created a condensed Bible which he called The Life and Morals of Jesus of Nazareth but which today is commonly referred to as The Jefferson Bible. This retired U.S. President omitted references to Jesus' miracles and to most other supernatural events. He referred to the Apostle Paul as "the first corruptor of the doctrines of Jesus" and warned that the writers of the New Testament were "ignorant, unlettered men." lefferson did not permit publication of his condensed Bible (others published it following his death), but used it for himself, for his devotion, and for a more restful sleep at night.

So it's time. It's past time, for me, and for you who listen to my sermons, because to not preach from the letters of Paul is like not feeding children one whole food group. My goal is not to make you love Paul, nor to give a comprehensive presentation of all the Pauline epistles—that would take far longer than the 12 weeks of fall. I am hoping to:

- tune in to what Paul was trying to say to his first listeners;
- awaken to what God may be saying to us today through the words of Paul;
- maintain curiosity about this Roman Pharisee who came to follow Jesus; and
- allow ourselves the freedom to say "I think Paul was wrong about that" while keeping the conversation alive.

On Sunday mornings during Midtime Ministry, our member Barb Schreur, graduate of Harvard Divinity School and candidate for ordained ministry in the PC (USA), will help broaden our *Paul in the Fall* journey with a closer look at Paul's social, religious, and geographical contexts. In Search of Peace

It was during the 2016 Lenten Season that we began to intentionally place a higher priority on the ways that we, the community of FPC of Holland, can grow as **Peacemakers**. We spent that Lent exploring scripture and personal practices of peace, culminating in a Peace Fair. We have continued this commitment in simple and significant ways such as: partnering with the Zadran family (they arrived March 17, 2016), hosting a Nonviolent Communication Seminar with Dr. Theresa Latini, leading two interfaith gatherings of women (*Piece by Peace* and *Brushes of Peace*), and most recently, Peace Camp.

It was at Peace Camp that I learned and observed that the skills necessary to be a peacemaker are rarely taught or learned by children or adults. There are basic concepts and commitments that one needs to have in order to be a peacemaker. For example, MJ and Jerry of Little Friends for Peace taught us the concept of a Peace Train (pictures included on page 7). Some of the cars of the peace train include: respecting the one you struggle with, think-collaborate on ways to fix the problem, agree on a solution, and celebrate. It was transformative to observe 6-11 year olds "re-wire" their brains with new tools for solving simple and significant problems.

I have become a more adamant believer in the old adage that peace begins with me. As a result, we are providing some great opportunities this fall to continue in our peacemaking journey. These include:

- International Day of Peace event at the Herrick Library on September 18;
- Peace Making Sunday on October I, along with an Evening of Peace from 5:30-7p;
- Opportunities for service in our community during October 15-27; and
- Prayer Practices of Peace on December 3, 10 & 17.

Look for more details and description of these events in our fall brochure and on the church website.

Jesus has always expected - even demanded - that his followers be peacemakers. Yet it seems all the more urgent and critical that we follow his model of non-violent love, leading in actions and words how to live in unity while celebrating diversity, and to make new commitments to being peacemakers in whatever way and capacity that makes sense for us. May we join our children, community, country and world in being people who seek

peace with all our body, mind, soul, and spirit.

A Message Regarding FPC Facilities

At its annual planning retreat earlier this year the FPC Session spent time discussing our facility and assessing how well it currently does/or does not, meet our needs and support our programs and activities. Here is a brief history of our facility:

- The original FPC church was constructed in the early 19 60's.
- In 1971 the educational unit was added.
- In 1980 changes were made that were mostly associated with interior remodeling.
- In 1989 major changes were made, increasing the building footprint to the east and relocating offices to allow for an expanded narthex.
- In 2007 bathrooms on the first floor level were expanded.
- In 2017 a major remodel of the lower level kitchen was completed.

Based on the discussion at the Session Retreat and subsequent planning follow up by the Business and Building Council and Session, the following items were identified as areas requiring attention:

- The north entrance off the parking lot is slippery, exposed to the elements and deteriorating. Our goal is for a safer and more protected entryway.
- 2) Determine if interior spaces can be either repurposed or re-designed to achieve:
 - a. a conference room/class room for 15-20;
 - b. a "church living room" (Parlor in past);
 - c. dedicated area for Mission/Outreach
 - d. a wholistic health/yoga meditation center
 - e. a second pre-school room with dual purpose as a nursery
- 3) Underutilized spaces which could be available for repurposing:
 - a. Children in Worship Room off the Fellowship Hall
 - b. Huron Room
 - c. "old" Choir Room
 - d. Superior Room on the lower level
- 4. Freshen the look of the Sanctuary, and create functional space for piano, organ and handicapped accessible choir loft.
- 5. Restrooms.
 - a. A second non-gender specific restroom.
 - b. Freshen the lower level restrooms.

At the beginning of the summer we put out an RFP for an architectural firm to assist us with developing a master plan to address these issues. Three firms responded to our RFP, and we have selected and begun work with Tom Nemitz and Mara Braspenninx from Cornerstone Architects based in Grand Rapids.

Our contract with them will have two phases:

Phase One - Programming and Conceptual Design:

- Produce program requirements of building & site from information received from the church and meetings as required with staff and committee.
- Review with staff and church committee members' assessment of program and proposed conceptual direction.
- Prepare conceptual design drawings, including preliminary budget estimate(s).

Phase Two - Design-Development, Construction Documentation, Bidding and Construction:

- Review and assess conceptual design with design team in preparation of bidding documents.
- Provide recommendations and conceptual design of different building systems (mechanical & electrical).
- Prepare specific development drawings, engineering (civil, structural, mechanical & electrical) and construction drawings that will serve as basis for bidding and construction by a construction manager.
- Prepare necessary bid documents for construction of the project.
- Assist with any necessary governmental approval process.
- Review bids received to assess merits of contractors and assist in awarding contracts.
- Provide site administration (preparation of project clarifications, bulletins, shop drawing review, etc.) and observations of construction during the construction phase.

Cornerstone will be meeting with and interviewing representatives of our various stakeholders, i.e. representatives from our various program and activity areas on a scheduled basis in mid-September. We anticipate a preliminary review of their findings and recommendations including schematic drawings to our congregation in early to mid December.

AN EVENING OF PEACE





Adult Midtime Class

This fall, a special Adult Midtime class will serve as a companion to the *Paul in the Fall* sermon series. We'll learn and think together about the contexts in which Paul wrote.

If you are interested in or curious about the social, economic, or political contexts of the ancient world, please come and join us in the Michigan Room on Sunday mornings at 9:45a as we explore what Paul says about himself, about race/ethnicity, gender, food, slavery, and the end of the world. We'll use all sorts of methods and objects to think about these things, so come no matter your learning style or your level of familiarity with Paul's writings. Note: The content of the class is still being developed, but I promise at least one clip from a Monty Python movie!)

Our goal will be to look at these ancient texts closely enough to ask questions like: Who's Paul responding to? What's he trying to persuade the recipients of his letters to do? What can we learn about those who oppose him by how he makes his arguments? Whose voices are absent from the texts? These are important questions, not only for Paul's letters, but for contemporary speeches, press releases, novels, editorials, Facebook posts, blogs, and beyond! I hope the skills we learn here will be helpful in our daily lives.

I hope the classes will build on each other, but I will also make sure that each week can stand alone, so feel free to come for the whole series, or to dip in and out as you have interest.

Local Mission: Partner Update Good Samaritan Ministries

Good Samaritan Ministries is one of FPC's local mission partners. The Outreach Committee wants to inform the church about the changes that have recently been made at Good Sam. Good Sam has had drastically reduced funding from the state and federal government for Community Housing Partners resulting in a very different format which they hope can still serve clients' needs. Their clients will have mentoring, case management, life skills education, and employment and rent assistance for 6 months instead of 18 months. Due to the lack of affordable housing, their clients' will have the opportunity to stay in the same houses but will pay the entire rent.

Good Sam has indicated that they can use our help in the following ways:

MOVE-IN TEAM: 3 – 6 people who work with the Volunteer Coordinator to provide tenants with the help they need to move into an equipped comfortable home.

MOVE-OUT TEAM: 3 – 6 people who work with the Volunteer Coordinator to provide tenants with the services they need in order to relocate successfully.

SUPPORT TEAM: 2 person team consisting of a support partner and prayer partner

SUPPORT PARTNER: a person who will provide support and encouragement to the tenant and their family.

PRAYER PARTNER: a person who will provide prayer coverage and encouragement for both the support partner and tenant.

WELCOME BASKETS: 2 people who collect supplies from a predetermined list and put together welcome baskets of basic supplies for incoming tenants.
