Ethical Lessons from the Dog God Park

Some of you know that David and I are parenting a second dog, Porter, a Springer Spaniel. Now a graduate from a Canine Good Citizenship Class, he is slightly less of a handful than he was in his first 12 months, but he's still a sassy bundle of energy, a surprisingly good retriever, and at happy intervals (mostly when exhausted) a sweet, affectionate addition the Knieriemen-Walter pack. (Note: Monk the 10 year old Tibetan Terrier is still with us.)

Like so many indoor dogs, Porter loves an excursion to the Dog Park. It's more than an opportunity to greet other dogs, beg at the feet of their treat-bearing owners, and run free for an hour; it's a opportunity for me to observe and learn about life, ethics, and manners from four-legged friends.

 we're at the park alone with no one for him to
 frolic with, I urge Porter to run as I walk laps and
 toss a tennis ball. I make my Fitbit walking goals
 as he runs ahead and back, ahead and back, more
 than tripling my distance. Friends helping friends
 makes everyone succeed.
- Variety only makes playtime more fun. Size, breed, color or age is irrelevant at the dog park.
 Every new dog is greeted at the gate with a rush of hospitality expressed by paw, tail, nose, and a cheerful barking translated as "Play with me, play with me, play with ME!" Only the humans seem to care when a same-breed dog arrives. That's when the competition and comparison begin.

FPC Budget—3rd Quarter Update

So far this calendar year, our giving continues to run ahead of last year by 3.76%, but behind our 2017 budget by \$24,495 or 6.7%. And while our expenses to date are under our budget, they do exceed our revenues by a little over \$15,000. We continue to have faith that our revenue over the last 3 months of the year will hit our budgeted revenue target. COST: Everything included (air fare, food, lodging, site entry fees);total cost of around \$4,000 per participant. Exact cost will be finalized in January of 2018.

This trip will be very similar to the trip that Sheri took as part of a Western Seminary class during January of 2017, led by Josh and Sally Vis. As a result, Sheri is a great resource about all of the learning and personal growth that come from this trip.

Worship Center: Keeping in Touch

Every Sunday in Worship Center after presenting the *story*, celebrants and children spend time wondering about the story. This evokes a sense of awe essential to worship and gives the celebrants and children time to talk about the story. It is the time for the celebrant to emphasize through the wondering statements the truths of the story and a time to relate the story to experiences the children face.

After wondering time, the children are ready to express themselves or think more about the story through art work, prayer corner, music, or working with the story materials they have just experienced. Special projects are kept to a minimum and allow for as much individuality as possible. Keeping their expressions of response personal to them lessens the feeling of the end product being predetermined by the adult and allows

for the child all means for self-expression, individual growth and dialogue with God.

By paying special attention to materials, space, and time, as well as by giving children respect and support for their work, we create conditions which assist children in releasing that which lies dormant and waiting within them. Only then can the child express her/his unique self—their inner being that meets God face-to-face.

YOUTH@FIRST

For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them. Matthew 18:20

There is something about having a sacred space to gather. Think about your favorite spaces to peacefully spend time with God, with others, and with yourself. As we approach Thanksgiving, some of you may have visions in your mind of scenes at home gathered around a table with your loved ones. Other times, our minds may go to the many interactions and moments in our weeks during which we have the opportunity to catch up with our friends, co-workers, bank-tellers...you name it. For me, my mind goes to Riley Trails because through college, seminary, and even now, I will walk those trails to pray and reflect, often taking friends along with me for a hike where we can mutually listen and be heard.

We have assurance in Christ's words above from the gospel of Matthew that by the power of the Holy Spirit, God is with us when we gather together. This year, I hope to create a hospitable place for our youth to gather, both in how we engage as a group and (more literally) making updates to the Youth Room. After an intense clean-up of the Youth Room this summer prior to my arrival, I continued to clear out and clean up the space. Last month, we purchased a large sectional couch that seats twelve people, and after a minor setback with a ceiling leak, the couch is assembled. These are great additions to the room, but I asked myself, how can we allow this space to reflect the students who will gather here? So I made a plan, prepared a color scheme, and handed over some paint brushes to the Sr. High students.

Our Mid High students had the wonderful opportunity to participate in the church-wide Evening of Peace on October I. Our Sr. High chose to continue that theme of peace on the walls of the youth room. Students were invited to paint a verse, quote, phrase, or piece of advice that exhibited and encouraged bringing about God's peace. The result is stunning! Now the walls of their gathering space sing anthems of peace and truth in a world that often times is anything but peaceful or authentic. What I appreciate most is the variety of script and handwriting represented on these walls. The vast variety of mark-making, lettering, and size come together in a manner that appears even more lovely than if any of the words stood alone. To me, it suggests that peace isn't achieved through uniformity, but rather unity. That peace occurs when our broad range of voices cries out together in a manner that leans into and celebrates the complexities and differences among us.

That is my prayer for the Youth Room, and FPC as a whole. I pray we continue to be a gathering space where we do not shy away from variety, but rather seek it out as a necessary platform for unity. For where two or three are gathered, Christ is there also. And what's more peaceful than Christ himself? Friends, I invite you to visit our Youth Room to see the wonderful work of the incredible, vibrant youth in our congregation! Continue to create spaces to spend time with God, self, and neighbor. Lean into complexity, pursuing peace in it. Above all, seek the ways that God is with you and those around you as you gather in a multitude of ways this month. - Erin

Why?

As our community changes, your Deacons want to be ready to adjust to any needs of the congregation that may emerge. We are also mindful that each Deacon has unique strengths and is not able to do everything that may be needed. It is important for the whole congregation to serve, so we are reorganizing the deacon program.

How?

Rather than be organized around parishes (which are growing as our community spreads out), we are going to organize around spiritual giftings. Deacons will no longer be asked to be the only primary responders to provide service but, instead, they will be asked to coordinate teams to respond.

What?

We are in the process of organizing 5 different teams to serve based on their skills and interests and are inviting the congregation to join us. We will need participation from everyone as we decrease the number of deacons from 15 "do-it-all" deacons to 6 "call me when you need us" coordinators, thus spreading the responsibility throughout the congregation.

ARCHITECTURAL PROJECT update

The Architectural Liaison Committee has been meeting regularly with Cornerstone Architects as Cornerstone digests the information received during the listening sessions with various church members.



The priority remains to resolve the issues relative to the north entrance. The goal is for a safer and more protected entryway. Other goals are to use existing space more effectively—especially the lower level—and to relieve some of the congestion in the Narthex during the M&M cafe times. The overall theme is to improve accessibility and safety for the entire property.

Cornerstone has presented the Committee with 5 different floor plan options that would address all of the issues presented by our members during the listening sessions. We will consider these various options over the next month with the goal of a final plan by late November.

Mark your calendars now for a presentation by Cornerstone and the Liaison Committee on Sunday evening, December 3. The recommended plan along with the estimated costs will be presented at that time. The final recommended plan will go to Session at their December meeting.
