A Place for All

"If you don't change, you die," said Mark Twain. Those words preface the FPC Strategic Plan introduction which has been guiding our mission since 2014.

In 2018, the Strategic Plan continues to guide the Session's discernment of how our building can be adapted to further our mission and ministries. A Master Plan developed through Cornerstone Architects last year suggests a comprehensive (and therefore expensive at 1.8 million dollars) expansion, renovation, and repurposing of spaces. In addition to the price tag, the Session's decisions on the final scope of the project will be determined by distinguishing the wants from the needs, and having clarity about the "why" behind each proposed change.

One could argue that a church doesn't need a building because the church is the people, that they are the church not only when they are gathered for worship but when they disburse to be Christ's hands and feet and voices in the world. However, a well cared for, thoughtfully designed church building can and does support and extend that ministry in a variety of ways. As the Building and Design Committee of Space for All has asked the "why" question, they've thus far identified six value statements. Do you agree with them? What would you add? Remove?

- FPC values numerical, spiritual, and programmatic growth.
- FPC values all people -- infants to youth to older adults.
- FPC values accessibility, safety, and security for its members and visitors.
- FPC values our ministry connections with the community at large. (AA for example)
- FPC values administrative efficiencies. (We call this good stewardship.)
- FPC understands that God's "welcome" is communicated not only by spoken theological convictions but also by a physically compelling

Session, in the coming two weeks, will be contemplating the "why" question for each part of the Master Plan. Some of the plan elements will filter out. Others will rise to the top.

Foolishness is written over change for the sake of change.

Wisdom is written over change guided by prayerfully articulated values and principles accompanied by wise and reasonable fund raising plans.

In the coming months, you will hear about opportunities to show your generosity and commitment to the ministries of Christ through FPC as the Capital Campaign activities get rolling.

The last lines of the Strategic Plan conclusion say:

"...prayers for open hearts, listening ears, and clear vision for and from our entire church family are essential as we grow into a vision of a vibrant congregation

that, long after our time here, will still gather in this place of worship to serve and live to the glory of God."

Transitions R Us

In recent days and in multiple conversations I have joked about getting a t-shirt printed with the church logo followed by "Transitions R Us". There are many transitions occurring in our common life right now. We have moved through Lent and Holy Week and are in the season of Easter. The dark of winter and early spring is giving way to lengthening light (thanks be to God). The Deacons are in the process of reorganizing their work into care teams so more of us can be involved in their ministry. It also includes implementing a new software system, Servant Keeper, to help us keep up with one another electronically. Outreach Council continues to strengthen our relationships with mission partners with increased "check-ins", site visits, and an upcoming mission fair. Outreach Council is also seeking new opportunities for partnerships and hands on mission. We've just come through a feasibility study and heard a report regarding a capital campaign. We are exercising our imaginations and hearts as we begin to consider building projects. And we are beginning the process for finding just the right person to join the rest of the staff in providing leadership.

Seems like that's a boatload of transitions. I don't know about you, but it seems like there's always something churning and changing in my personal life, too. I have to remind myself that we shouldn't be surprised at so much change. It's organic. Like every other organism created, we are part of creation and consequently the cycle of creation. Life is dynamic, not static. And when I get "prickly" about change, I remind myself of what some famous psychologist (Erikson?) said, "All change is perceived as loss." That's why we have mixed feelings at happy occasions like weddings and graduations and the first day of first grade for our first child.

The second thing I remind myself is, we aren't engaging in change simply for the sake of change or even because we just got bored with the way things are. We are engaging in change for the sake of faithful transformation—renewal, revitalization, or dare I say, resurrection. Previous generations and iterations of our community went through what we are going through now. Out of gratitude for God's love lived through this fellowship, they talked and listened and considered and prayed about what they needed to be doing in the present to be able to grow faithfully into the future. Some of us who are around now, were around then. (See if you can find Kevin Oswald in one of the photos of a previous construction era.) For those of us who are adults, it's easy to forget that when we were young, someone cared enough for us and for our futures to do the faithful yet uncomfortable work of transformation.

On Easter day and throughout the season of Easter, we celebrate the

transformative power of God's love given to us in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. May that love and power enable us to move gracefully through the boatload of transitions ahead.

Blue Sunday is a national faith-based initiative to raise awareness about child abuse and neglect prevention. It is with open hearts and wisdom that we continue to seek ways to keep our children safe. Recently, it was suggested that we offer a program for our children on safe touch. On Sunday, April 29, the Prevention Educator of the Children's Advocacy Center in Holland, will be presenting two 20-minute child-friendly presentations. The goal is to give our children the skills for personal safety using age appropriate language. Parents and/or Grandparents are encouraged to attend with their children. Preschoolers—1st graders are encouraged to attend the presentation held at 9:45a. 2nd-3rd graders are encouraged to attend the presentation at 10:20a. Both presentations will be held in the Lower Level 2nd/3rd grade Worship Center. Worship Center classes will continue as scheduled. If you wish for your child to not attend, we will have an alternative place for them to be.

YOUTH@FIRST

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener...Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me." - John 15: 1 & 4

As we wrap up the "I Am" sayings of Jesus, I find myself both compelled and convicted. Even though Christ mercifully saves us from ourselves and our sin, he does not condemn. However, in the gospels he does (lovingly) say some of the most difficult things that require self-examination, confession, and a new receival of grace. Thus, I found myself in that cycle this Lenten season: convicted of things I have not wholly offered up to God, repentant, and then compelled to lean into a new way by living in brave gratitude of the grace I've received through Christ alone.

The idea of Christ as the True Vine and me as a branch is a metaphor with which I have long struggled. Perhaps this is because the easier route to take would be to act as the Vine myself and make Jesus a branch of me. If I am the Vine, that means Jesus can be a branch of me among other branches: my education, my ideologies, my politics, my will, my ideas, MY way. We all interpret data in light of our ultimate authority, and if I am the Vine, I am afforded the luxury of projecting all of those aforementioned things about me onto Jesus. I would be able to say, "Christ means this or that. Christ would only vote this way, or think just like me. Christ only likes people who think or function like me, not those people. Christ must come along with me as I decide

ultimate good." Frankly, with me as the Vine, Christ would begin to look a lot like...well, me.

Wouldn't that be nice? It would be far more comfortable. And man, how easily we all do that. How readily do each of us, (no matter race, creed, political affiliation, occupation, favorite ice cream, etc.) do that? We do it because it seems comfortable: it appears inclusive; it's what we know; it's easy. However, it strips other branches on the True Vine of their dignity. It means that other branches who don't look like me, think like me, use their money like me, speak like me, or vote like me must not be part of the Vine. It's entirely exclusive. Yet worst of all, it strips Christ of his divinity, his mystery, and his complexity. It takes away his "Vineness", and grants him the mere placement of a branch. And thus, fruit ceases to come, and the branches wither.

Scripture tells us that only if we remain in the True Vine can fruit be produced. As we approach the Easter season, I am learning to morph. I am re-visiting my rightful location as a branch, not the Vine. I desire to know Christ, not Erin, for only in knowing him will I ever truly know myself anyway. That's my prayer entering into Easter: that with Christ as the vine, (though more difficult than "self" as vine), we experience the true fullness of the gospel in order to lean into a new way. - Erin



April 21 at 1:00p




