A Place for All Construction Update

Good News!

Our goal for our construction project has been to be able to complete all the phases of the project outlined in the Pledge Campaign Blue Brochure within our target budget of \$1.2 million. We have met with our construction manager, Lakewood Construction Company, and Cornerstone Architects and now have a plan to be able to achieve our goal.

They have advised us that the current bidding environment is very challenging. Most subcontractors have their project schedules full and either are not interested in bidding at all or their prices are very high. Lakewood has recommended that we bid the project now but for a mid-winter start rather than a November 1 start. While there is no guarantee, they believe that by bidding for a later start, construction bids will be lower. That alone, however, will not be enough to hit our target, so they (with support from Cornerstone Architects) have suggested a couple of modifications to the current construction/remodeling plans that will reduce the cost of the project. By taking these two steps, they believe that it will be possible for us to be able to

- 1) Vote. Be a participant in democracy which our forebears fought for. And to paraphrase of friend of mine, if you don't act, you can't gripe. If you aren't registered to vote in the election on November 6, register now so you are eligible to vote in the next election.
- 2) Whoever wins, pray for them. Pray that they will make wise, intelligent, informed decisions in a world where issues are complex.
- 3) God is neither Democrat, Republican, Green, or Socialist. People of good faith and sincerity may differ in the application of their faith to the political life. On November 11, two of our members, Janet Magennis and Jack Holmes will present how their faith influences their vote and invite all who attend to consider that relationship in their own life.
- 4) Be civil in all your speech and ,so far as possible, in your inner life. Hyperbole, name calling, deliberately declaring provable falsehoods have no place in either the Christian life or in civil society.
- 5) Contemplate the tension between Jesus' command to love neighbor as self (Matthew 22:29) and the Apostle Paul's injunction "Do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence but through love become slaves to one another." (Galatians 5:13) with the 17th Century philosophy of John Locke who was influential in founding our country who wrote "the purpose of the state is to establish and enforce laws that clearly separate what is mine from what is thine." How do the U.S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights differ from or resonate with the teachings of Jesus, the critique of the Hebrew Prophets, and the epic stories of exodus, exile, and return? Which do you turn to first?

On November 7, the day following these mid-term elections, David and I will be in Chicago seeing *Hamilton*. I'm studying up on the lyrics and music to make the best of my investment in the pricey tickets (even in the nosebleed section). I came upon this clever rhyme expressing religious skepticism as Hamilton's foil, Aaron Burr, reflects on his view of the world. His reference is to his grandfather, the long winded preacher Jonathan Edwards.

"My grandfather was a fire and brimstone preacher But there are things that the homilies and hymns won't teach ya"

Maybe on the ride home on the train, I'll contemplate the relationship between his religious skepticism in the 18th century and its recurrent popularity now in the 21st century and how that dynamic may affect our nation's 2018 midterm election.

Beanie Babies to the Rescue

In the summer of 2016, our youth embarked on a mission trip to Pittsburgh, PA. One of their encounters was with a woman who needed help decluttering her home. In gratitude for their assistance, she offered up her collection of Beanie Babies and suggested the youth could use them to raise funds to help someone else. The Beanie Babies were accepted (all three 18 gallon storage bins full) and transported back to FPC where they have resided against the back wall of the youth room ever since.

Unsolicited material donations are not unusual. However, they can be quite a problem in the aftermath of a disaster

causing what is known as a "disaster after the disaster", which then requires resources to manage it. For example, following the school shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary, hundreds of thousands of teddy bears poured into a relatively small community. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance was asked and able to deploy a highly gifted and organized volunteer to manage the donations.

Fast forward to 2018, and a conversation at a recent staff meeting regarding the need to clear areas in preparation for the building renovation. We talked about various areas and the people and programs that were using the areas and would need to help clear things out. Then Sheri asked, "What about the Beanie Babies?" After some conversation, it seemed those Beanie Babies might still find a role in helping others, albeit not the originally suggested one. Law enforcement and emergency response personnel use them to give to children in traumatic situations, to make a positive connection and to offer a means for a child to self soothe as best they can under the circumstances. So, the bins of Beanie Babies will make their way to the Holland Police to be offered as comfort to those in stress.







In the wake of recent disasters, many wonder how to help. The needs are great and will be ongoing for many years. The best way to help at the moment is to pray for those who are affected and donate money. Pick your favorite reputable voluntary organization, and if you don't yet have one, try Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. You can donate to the general disaster fund or to a particular disaster response. See their website at www.pda.pcusa.org. You can also be the conduit so others learn of ways to help – much like we have been the conduit for Beanie Babies.

Another way to help is to consider actively participating in the recovery. The Outreach Council is organizing a Mission Trip to an affected area to take place sometime in January or February. Details to come. If you have an interest or ideas in that regard, contact Bill Haines or me.

I would like to share with you a piece of how we are assisting our Children in the Worship Center—(with gratitude, to Colette Volkema DeNooyer), portions taken from Worship Center Training, copyright 2000.

Our Celebrants are responsible for preparing the physical environment, the intentionality in the way the room is organized, and all that is offered on a Sunday morning. We are responsible for preparing ourselves; to prepare for telling/presenting the story, being sensitive and informed as well as continuing to grow and deepen in our own faith so that we might have something to give, something of passion and insight. The emotional environment piece is in showing the children respect and acceptance. This does not mean we idealize them; we set

limits. It also means the children's well-being is our first concern. Our children experience freedom of choice with enough time to satisfy their need to pursue a question or a project. We model "wondering" as well as a place where thinking and open-endedness is valued. This is an environment where the question is more important than the one "right" answer.

One of those moments happened this past week. A friend in our 3rd /4th /5th grade WC wondered "Does God live in Heaven?" An interesting conversation followed. All present felt the freedom to share their thoughts, with no judgment. Do you have questions... along with a safe place to share them? Thank you for gifting our Children and acknowledging the need for that sacred space.

complete all phases of our project (outlined in the Blue Pledge Brochure) for our target of \$1.2 million.

In reality, there are a number of advantages for this approach:

- Access to the main (north) entrance to the church will not be hindered during the winter months.
- A significant portion of the work will be done in the summer months which will minimize impact on church programming.
- Lakewood's costs of providing a heated environment for the winter construction period will be reduced.
- We have the opportunity to generate some interest revenue from the pledge income we have received.
- The code enforcement department for the City of Holland is backed up and the permit necessary to begin our project will not support an early November start date.
- There are a couple of design details that have not yet been resolved and the delay would allow adequate time to resolve those items.

The majority of the changes in the construction project itself will not be evident to most congregation members. These include, for example, substituting less expensive (but attractive and serviceable) materials in parts of the project. The noticeable change will be using a ramp in the sanctuary to provide ease of access to the chancel for choir members, church service participants, etc. By doing this, we can eliminate the previously planned lift that was to be located in the narthex to provide handicap access to the chancel. This will create a more spacious and attractive narthex, improve traffic flow in accessing the elevator, and make a significant reduction in the project cost.

Please be clear that the A Place for All Building Design Committee is excited about these changes as they will help us achieve our goal of completing all phases of the project within the budget limits established by Session.

We initiated the project on Sunday, October 14, with a ceremonial "groundbreaking" ceremony during both worship services. Representatives of Lakewood Construction and Cornerstone Architects participated.

We look forward to moving forward on our project with a combination of Faith and Flexibility.
