A Place for All, Construction Update

After months of careful planning and prioritizing, our renovation/construction project is finally under way. At its December meeting, the Session approved entering into a contract with Lakewood Construction for an amount not to exceed \$1,291,808.

This will allow us to implement the base project described in the blue "A Place for All" capital campaign booklet plus the other 3 priorities described there. In other words:

Base project (Priority 1)

- New accessible north entrance with airlock and exterior canopy for sheltered drop-off
- Coat room at the north entrance
- Enhanced narthex with new furnishings, carpet and paint

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Intentional Noise

One of my best childhood holiday memories is being in Philadelphia on New Year's Day for the Mummers Parade. My grandfather's employer allowed his staff and their families to look down on Broad Street as the parade went by. There is nothing like a Mummers band! The musicians dress in elaborate and colorful costumes making each musician appear at least twice as tall and wide as they are. Their music is loud! It's noisy enough that the strains of music reached up to the sixth floor where we were perched inside on the window sills. The folk tunes are played on saxophones and strings, banjos, accordions, violins, glockenspiels and bass violins. The Mummers don't just march, they dance and give the impression that they are having great fun. Perhaps that's what appealed to me as a child: lively music, colorful costumes, and choreographed dance. It's simply delightful, totally unique, and in my childhood memories... NOISY! Perhaps that's why, even now, my memories of those New Year's Day events remain strong.

Why share this memory with you? I'm thinking about noise in 2019. We are due for some clanking, banging, and drilling in the coming weeks and months as the **Place for All** building project gets underway. (Sound proof ear phones anyone?) We've been talking about this for more than a year, and finally, on February 16, we are underway! We're in for some real noise! Productive, intentional, and purposeful construction noise.

As I think about the year ahead, I'm pondering another kind of noise. As a congregation in this community, I sense that we're comfortable keeping the volume down; we are reserved about telling people who we are, what unique place we have in the Christian environment in Holland, and most importantly, why anyone would want to be part of this faith community. We aren't comfortable with that classic Holland question "what church do you go to?". Our Capital Campaign consultant, John Laster, believes we are the "best kept secret in Holland" and suggests that there are many folks in the area who would appreciate our flavor and expression of Christianity, particularly our worship, our friendliness and our inclusion of LGBTQ folks. He suggested we might even think about a billboard!

I'm not sure about a billboard, but then, why not? I believe John was saying that we need to get noisier about who we are, and that if we do, we'd have fewer empty seats on a Sunday morning. But not only that. There are folks seeking a church community like us but who don't know it exists in greater Holland and are praying to find us.

In 2019, at Session, with staff, and on Sunday mornings, I'll be encouraging us to get noisier about that subject Presbyterians so often shy away from: the "E" word. Evangelism — FPC style.

Do I hear an AMEN?!





Action prevailed to approve bid proposal report received through A Place For All Design Team. Please refer to detailed article on page one by Larry Grinwis.

Received first reading of preliminary 2019 Budget with anticipated income of \$516,013. and expenses of \$523,208. Our intentions are to close that gap by the January Session Meeting.

- Open stairwell to lower level at the south entrance with new windows on exterior wall
- · Enhanced security and technology
- Arts and worship room—room for choir robes and sink for communion prep
- Fresh finishes including new carpet and paint in upper/main level renovated areas
- Improved accessibility and baby changing facilities at the Main Level Family Toilet Room

Priority 2

- Worship Centers relocated to be all together in the lower level
- New furnishings and finishes including ceiling grid and tiles, lighting, paint, and floor coverings
- New operable partition

Priority 3

- Renovated Fellowship Hall with loop system
- New flooring with prayer labyrinth
- New lighting and ceiling grid and tiles
- Fresh paint

Priority 4

New Family Restroom in lower level with accessible toilet, shower, washer and dryer

Construction will begin inside on the lower level in mid February and the new north entrance, etc. will be initiated in the Spring (exact date yet to be determined).

By delaying the start of the project and modifying some of our plans (for example eliminating the lift and replacing it with a ramp in the Sanctuary to enhance access to the chancel) we were able to reduce the cost of the project by approximately \$127,000.

Along with the capital campaign costs and the interest on the construction loan, we expect that the total expense for this project will be approximately \$1.4 million. Pledges to date on our capital campaign total approximately \$1.1 million, leaving a gap of roughly \$300,000.

While we will ultimately need to decide how we will cover that gap, that's not a decision we need to make right now. Here are some of the options for covering the gap—and they are not mutually exclusive.

- We receive additional pledges for the capital campaign—either from new members or increased pledges from current members.
- We carry a mortgage for the remaining gap—this could either be a long term mortgage (20 years) or short term (3-5 years).
- We conduct another capital campaign at some point after the expiration/completion of the current 3 year campaign.

We rejoice together that we are moving forward to enhance the safety, accessibility and functionality of our facility to support both our members and our community.

Art Alcove Features Local Artist, Bob Tucker



Stop in the Art Alcove to see the latest display of intricate scroll saw work by Bob Tucker. After a major stroke in 2002, he had to re-learn the approach to his hobby since his entire right side was paralyzed. Through extensive physical therapy and investing in equipment easier to handle he was able to begin making simple pieces

again. His determination allowed him to create progressively more intricate designs that contain over 1,500 cuts.

Bob considers his stroke a "STROKE OF FAITH." Bob lives in Freedom Village where he has converted one of his rooms to accommodate his studio. One of the pieces in our display contains a piece he entered into ArtPrize in Grand Rapids.
