Join us as we begin our Lenten journey together with a service of readings, quiet reflection and the imposition of the ashes.

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

That was how I felt last Sunday morning after turning my ankle at 8:15. There's no good story

Mad. Grateful. Sore.

to tell: I wasn't on an icy driveway being yanked by a dog; I wasn't running away from a dragon; I wasn't in 3" stilettos. I simply missed the bottom step while heading down the back stairway to unlock the door. When I saw my ankle lying horizontally on the floor I knew it was bad even before the pain kicked in—and hurt it did. Like the Devil. What also kicked in, however, was the early service emergency care team. Feeling faint, I found one of M and M Cafe benches to be a fine stretcher and gratefully accepted the ministrations of my "emergency responders". Michelle brought me water and made a Ziploc bag ice bag and Mike held the ice; Dean readily agreed to pick up an extra liturgist duty; Cully brought me ibuprofen and rounded up my sermon manuscript and picked up the announcements and the Children's Message; Tim set a chair and foot rest on the chancel from which I could preach.

And there was more caregiving to come. Between the services Alan showed up with an ACE wrap and set of crutches. Larry drove my car home. By second service the pain had subsided and most of my helplessness had passed, but not without granting me an opportunity for an afternoon of contemplating what I could learn from this accidental fall.

I don't believe God is some kind of an ogre "sending" suffering or trials to teach us lessons, but I do believe that when suffering happens, we can try to make meaning of the event. I've thought about three things the last few days while I've tended this foot:

+Whether one travels at 5 mph or 50 mph the place the destination will look the same. I usually go at 75mph! Now as I walk down the hall I'm trailing behind rather than leaving someone else in my wake. To be forced to slow down and let my foot heal has meant my whole body was allowed to rest as well.

+FPC has eager, trained, sensitive caregivers. Three athletic coaches, one Red Cross worker, a nurse, and two physicians gave me matter of fact and wise advice. They weren't just there for me. They would be there for you.

+And finally, I am grateful. For this community of faith, its support of me, and for all of us together. Caregivers, whether pastoral or medical or parental, are notoriously bad patients. Gratitude rises to the surface when we are knocked off our game and need to depend on the kindness of others.

So we move into Lent, the long waiting period for Easter. I invite you to slow down, even if a sprained ankle or flu or a surgery doesn't force it upon you. Travel a little slower and smell the roses. Look around on a Sunday morning and know that we are gifted in the congregation to do and be for one another and the world exactly what God needs us to do and to be And finally, be buoyed by the fact that we are in interdependent web of bodies and souls inhabiting this little piece of soil, and let your gratitude arise.

A Season of Change



During our morning in worship with the 3rd/4th/5th grade Worship Center, the Parable of the Great Banquet was being shared.

After the Parable, kids began to wonder. "I wonder why the first people who accepted the invitation all declined with

excuses on the day of the feast"? "Pharisees did not believe this was The One they were waiting for, the promised Kingdom" and "they were too busy with their own lives to do what was the right thing to do – to follow Jesus and to make Jesus number one". "I wonder why the (maimed, lame, poor and blind) weren't invited first/or with the Pharisees? "Maybe, like in school, you should invite everyone together, so no one is left out" and "The Pharisees thought they were rich and probably too good to eat with the others". "Parables are like seeing with Epiphany Eyes and Ears".

Jesus, the One who was willing to speak to those who no one else would speak to; He did not believe that sick people were being punished by God, and He healed them; Jesus believed that the Law was made to help people not to hurt them; He was not afraid to stand up to the Keepers of the Law – the Pharisees; Jesus told parable stories to help us see the way God sees. Is it no wonder that people began to follow Him?

Reverse STEWARDSHIP stories

I was excited to take part in our Reverse Stewardship activity and be entrusted with \$20 to be used at my discretion. I was thinking of adding my donation to the \$20 and sending it on to a well known ministry in our community that, according to the letter and return address envelope we had received in the mail, feeds "a homeless neighbor a hot, hearty Thanksgiving meal." But then something happened to change my mind.

After church that day I received the \$20 bill in an FPC envelope, my husband, Neal, and I went to confront a neighbor in our condo community about the car with two flat tires that had been sitting in his driveway for two weeks. The disabled car was in direct violation of our association bylaws, and the neighbor had not responded to email requests to rectify the situation. Neal, who is President of our condo association, was charged with the unpleasant task of going to talk to the neighbor about the infraction. I went with him as moral support, and we both were a bit anxious about what kind of reception we would get. The 20-something man who came to the door was no doubt expecting cross words since he had ignored the notices the car needed to be moved. He sheepishly explained his current unfortunate circumstances. His previous vehicle had been totaled in an accident and he'd lost his job as a result of not having transportation to work. He had bought the car in his driveway for \$500, not realizing the tires were going to go flat as soon as he got it home. Now, he was waiting for his first paycheck from a new job so he could pay for new tires. As he closed the door he happened to mention some other bills might not get paid, but he would make sure to purchase new tires for his not so new car.

Later that day we shared this young man's woes with another association board member. I explained to her the Reverse Stewardship Activity in which I was participating at church. We both decided to add another \$20 to the envelope from FPC and walked down the street to present our neighbor with \$60 to use toward the purchase of new tires. The big grin on his face as he accepted the envelope was all the thanks we needed.

This experience reminded me of the familiar Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10. In the parable, the "expert in the law" asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus replies, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind," and, "Love your neighbor as yourself." The lawyer challenges Jesus when he asks, "And who is my neighbor?" By this time Jesus is no doubt exasperated and tells him the story of the Samaritan who came across a half-dead man who had been attacked by a robber and stripped of his clothes. After bandaging the man's wounds, the Samaritan put him on his donkey and took him to a local innkeeper, to whom he gave two silver coins to look after the man until he could return to check in on him.

It was a rewarding experience to participate in this Reverse Stewardship activity and to help out a neighbor in need. I will probably still send a donation to the organization who will be feeding homeless people a hearty Christmas dinner!

She will touch on the programs currently set up to help these children and their families, their demographics, the process from country of origin to reunification, funding and what those interested can do to help. After her

presentation, Rachel will answer any questions about the refugee and immigrant policy, resettlement and services available.


