Summer Reading

One of the questions I asked our candidates for the associate pastor position in my early conversation was what have you been reading? It's only fair that I share my answer to that question with you. Here are a few of my recent reads and yet to be opened summer volumes. I'd love to hear what you're reading too!

Once Upon a River, by Diane Setterfield:

An exquisitely written novel exploring the power of story and the intersection of science, mystery, and truth. Setterfield's characters are likable, beautifully developed, and wholly sympathetic. Using the river Thames and its series of riverside inns as the geographical center allows opportunity for readers to float, boat, sink, swim through the mystery of a girl's drowning and her identity. I have this author's first novel, The Thirteenth Tale on my summer reading list.

In the Time of Butterflies: I heard a rumor this was the 2019 Big Read so picked up a used copy (published in 1994 and made into a movie in 2001). Author Julia Alvarez fictionalizes the events of the Mirabel sisters who worked to overthrow the mid 20th century 30 year dictatorship of Rafael Trujillo in the Dominican Republic. The history is tragic, the actions of the sisters heroic, the author's artistic portrayal of this time period, emotionally moving.

Summer Reading ... continued

<u>The Power</u>, by Naomi Alderman: What if society's power structure is flipped and women discover they can generate electrical power to control and injure others? This dystopic novel terrifies, exposes, intrigues, and angers as gender roles reverse and readers are forced to consider how power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely. Not for queasy readers.

As an avid member of the Louise Penny fan club, I eagerly await the next adventure of Chief Inspector Armand Gamache and his comrades in the fictional Three Pines, Quebec. <u>A Better Man</u> will be released at the end of August. And yes, it's pre-ordered!

Turning to the spiritual, I received <u>The President's Devotional</u> as a Christmas gift. Joshua DuBois, religious affairs director for the Obama Campaign, compiles 365 selections of the daily devotional e-mails he sent to President Obama during his presidency. Every president should be so fortunate to have pithy, Biblically based reflections to start their day. Inspiring reading for anyone abiding in the complex intersection of public life and personal faith.

Good and Mad: The Revolutionary Power of Women's Anger by Rebecca Traister: Perhaps you, like I, have heard this author on a news broadcast. I was intrigued, but why read something else which will stoke my anger? But someone gave it to me as a gift, so I read it and was surprised. It is not a rant, but an eloquent historical expose of how women's rage has changed and can still change society in healthy ways And yes, the author has a particular point of view!

David tells me I must read <u>The End of a Presidency: The Power of Impeachment</u>. Already fed up with polarizing news coverage of both the White House and the ramping up 2020 political marathon I wasn't sure a political read is what either my mind or spirit needed. But when I read in a review from the Atlantic that this volume is an "aspirin to cool a political fever", and in another review that the Laurence Tribe and Joshua Matz book is "not a legal brief or political strategy memo," and in yet another that it's "fair-minded without being bland," I've added this to my coffee table pile.

Finally, I've just completed <u>Growing Young: Six Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church</u>. Researched and written by three young researchers and church professionals at the Fuller Youth Institute, this volume is impressively researched, inspirational, and full of practical ideas. The authors intend it be used as a strategy for engaging youth and young adults in ways that breathe life into the *whole* church. I'll be suggesting at our next Session meeting that <u>Growing Young</u> becomes a guide for us as we welcome a new associate pastor and set goals for the coming year.

reimagining church leadership. He writes of Meriwether Lewis finding and drinking from the headwaters of the Missouri River and believing, "... he would walk up the hill, look down a gentle slope that would take his men a half day to cross with their canoes on their backs, and then they would see the Columbia River. After fifteen months of going upstream they looked forward to letting the current swiftly whisk them to the Pacific Ocean. They would crest the hill, find the stream and coast to the finish line. They could not have been more disappointed. What Lewis actually discovered was that three hundred years of experts had all been completely and utterly wrong. In front of him was not a gentle slope ...but the Rocky Mountains."

than the one we are leaving behind. As Bolsinger writes, "If you can adapt and adventure, you can thrive. But you must let go, learn as you go and keep going no matter what."

Bolsinger goes on to say, "And at that moment everything that Meriwether Lewis assumed about his journey changed...Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery were about to go off the map and into uncharted territory. They would have to change plans, give up expectations, even reframe their entire mission...What would they do now?...they had run out of water. How do you canoe over mountains? You don't. If you want to continue forward, you change. You adapt."

It is a dynamic time in the life of FPC. New space and new leadership offer the opportunity to reorient and work together with your new Associate Pastor to consider anew the context for your mission and to "adapt and adventure." Note the emphasis on work together with. You may be tempted to think that you can sit back in the canoe and relax while your new pastor paddles. Please don't do that. When he asks for your partnership and participation, say "Yes!" Or if you can't say "Yes!", help him find someone else who can. I know you will welcome him and his family with the same kindness and generosity you have shared with me.

After our seventeen months together, you can probably guess where I'm going with this. It has been quite a journey – transitions in nearly every aspect of the life of the church. In June, our time

past October. In late August 2018, Muhammad, mom (Javlay) and his three sisters (Hajira, Radia, and Zaro-Jana) traveled to Pakistan for the weddings of all three sisters. Muhammad and his mom returned in mid September, and the three sisters returned on October 20th.

In January, Lighthouse Immigration Services started the process to get visas for the three husbands. It is hoped that within two years they will be able to join their wives in the United States.

The youngest sister (Hajira) is expecting a child mid-June.
