Get prepared to listen to beautiful new sounds of worship at First Presbyterian!

Music is an important component of worship, moving us emotionally and helping us find new ways to connect and grow in faith.

We were blessed to receive a generous bequest, a portion of which was earmarked for music enhancement. After deliberation in both the Worship Council and Session, we are pleased to share that we will soon be adding some exciting new elements to our

music program, benefitting both services. You will see a reconfigured chancel featuring a grand piano and slightly modified choir loft, and for the 1st Service, the regular contribution of a classic trio of professional musicians playing flute, cello and piano. The trio will also play on occasion at the 2nd service. The addition of the musicians will begin in September, with chancel changes happening shortly thereafter.

The calibre of the musicians and calibre of the instrument promise to create a component of worship that we hope will be both beautiful and meaningful. Please come join us for worship and listen for the sounds of the Spirit.

Reconstructing Family Values

Yes, our fall Sunday morning theme is meant to grab your attention and raise vour evebrows!

This fall season begins with a reconstructed FPC building— almost, but not quite completed.

First came the noisy, messy, chaotic deconstruction and demolition in the spring and early summer and then the more exciting reconstruction.

New construction and reconstruction sure beat deconstruction! But the former can't happen until completion of the later!

Family Values? Now there's a politically loaded and religiously laden term! Those who use it presume everyone knows what they mean, and that every family (and politician) should affirm the same values, that there is only one way to be a religiously faithful family, and, in other words, that there is one way to do family "right."

By "family" we mean this church family, this faith community—First Presbyterian Church of Holland congregation. Values? Christian churches share some common values, but there are in the Christian world and even in the Presbyterian world, both large differences and subtle nuances. And that's okay! Christians and the churches they worship in do not need to be some cookie cutter version of "proper" church.

Initially constructed during the creation of the Strategic Plan of 2014, and recently de- and then re-constructed at Session's August meeting, these ten FPC Value statements try to express who we are, how we do what we do, and what we want others to know about what makes us this particular family. No one need sign on the bottom line, but I expect they will ring true for members and friends of the church family. If they don't, what a good place to further the conversation!

I once read that differences in the way Christians "do" church isn't about the meat, it's about the seasonings. There's no reason to criticize the seasonings others use—salsa or herbal, curried or Southern fried. We don't need to criticize another's palate or culinary "school."

It is helpful to occasionally observe our seasonings, remembering that Value Statements
found on page 5. the "protein" doesn't change: Christ is the head of the church, the One who shows us what the reconciling love of God is like, the One whose message to love God and one another as ourselves, and the One who compels us to trust him in this life and into the Next.

Reconstructing Family Values? Yes! And what a great opportunity we all have this fall to to invite someone to church and show them the spice of Life here at First Pres!

Wiggles of Encouragement

As of this morning, my son, Benjamin, is missing one of his top front teeth. It was a momentous moment full of fear and joy and innocence. It is easy for us to see that final tug as the moment that he lost the tooth, but in reality, Ben was losing the tooth for much longer.

Several months ago, he noticed that the tooth was starting to move, but just slightly. Each day he worked at it little by little—twisting, tugging, touching with his tongue. Last week he took a bite out of a snow cone and it really loosened up the tooth. (It was more of an ice cone than a snow cone). This morning it was hanging by just a thread and he gave it one last tug and it finally popped out.

The tooth didn't come out with just one pull. Each wiggle, bite of food, tiny tug, brought the tooth to the point where it was ready to fall out.

As Ben was going through the process of losing a tooth, I have been listening to a song called "Your Labor is Not in Vain."

The song was written by Wendell Kimbrough as part of the "Porter's Gate" project—a collection of church leaders, musicians and artists that gathered to write music for the next generation of the church. It is a beautiful song. I encourage you to listen to it. (You can find it by googling the name or looking it up on youtube. If that doesn't work for you, stop by my office and I'll sing it for you!)

Here are some of the lyrics:

Your labor is not in vain

Though the ground underneath you is cursed and stained

Your planting and reaping are never the same But your labor is not in vain

I am with you, I am with you
I am with you, I am with you
For I have called you, called you by name
Your labor is not in vain

The song is about the work that we do in response to God calling us by name. At First Pres. we are working to make the world a more accepting, loving and welcoming place, but it often seems like these values come up against the values of the world. This can be tiring work as we come up against roadblocks and setbacks in our efforts to share the love of Christ.

But as the song reminds us (borrowing language from 1 Cor. 15:58), our labor is not in vain. God is with us, God has called us by name, and when we labor for the gospel, God is faithful to see us through. The work that we do each day is like the months of little wiggles that led to Ben's tooth finally coming out. Each wiggle on its own didn't seem like much, but together, through time and continued effort, the tooth came out. Each time we show love, each time we stand up for the oppressed, each time we open our arms and welcome all, each of these is a bit of work that will lead to a world where, as the song says at the end, "The houses [we] labored to build, will finally with laughter and joy be filled...and all that is broken be healed."

This is my encouragement to all of you. Keep working. Keep sharing the gospel of love and acceptance and welcome with everyone you meet. Let them experience the love of Christ through you, knowing that your labor is not in vain. Little by little the world will be healed and our homes will be filled with laughter and joy.


Worship Centers KEEPING IN TOUCH


September 13 @ 7:30p 2nd Friday Night Film Series
