After Bricks and Mortar

"Without a vision the people perish." Proverbs 29:18

We are alive and flourishing: A vision has come to fruition!

- In 2014, an unformed idea for building improvements became a goal of the Strategic Plan.
- In 2016, Session appointed a Building Project exploratory team.
- In 2017, Session contracted with architectural firm Cornerstone Architects and at the end of that year presented plans to the congregation.
- In early 2018, Session authorized a Capital campaign and contracted with consultant John Laster of Horizons Stewardship.
- In late 2018, with pledges for 1.1 million dollars in hand, A Place for All
 was authorized.
- In March 2019, with Cornerstone architects and Lakewood construction on board, we broke ground.

On January 4-5 we celebrate a vision which Session, staff, and all of you believed would augment First Presbyterian Church's ability to do God's work in worship, outreach, and fellowship. The full-size elevator will serve those for whom stairs are a challenge; the renovated and consolidated children in worship areas say "you're important" to our youngsters; the ramp in the sanctuary serves worship leaders and choir members unable to safely maneuver stairs; an expanded narthex area offers both added space and a safer entrance during wet and icy weather; a gender-neutral restroom offers a shower and washer/dryer. And more! Attention to natural light, fresh furnishings, and carpet. And for spiritual practice and contemplation, a labyrinth designed right into the carpet in the Fellowship Hall.

But... the project was never only about bricks and mortar. If we believe the Spirit of God is calling us to be a vibrant, fresh Place for All, there is another sort of building we must do: building our church community through new visitors and members; creating intergenerational ministries as well as events for specific stages and ages; strengthening our care for one another through illness and loss; continuing our emphasis on strong, creative, world relevant worship; reaching out to those who need the people and the spaces of First Presbyterian Church. This is not just the ministry of staff or Session. It's work for us all. *Continued on page 2.*

Love and Logic

Parenting with Love and Logic
One of the best villains in all of
cinema and literature (in my
opinion) is The Trunchbull from
Roald Dahl's Matilda. The
Trunchbull is the headmistress of
the school that Matilda attends and
she is a true terror for the kids. She
hammer throws a girl by her
pigtails, she has a narrow
closet lined with glass and nails

called the Chokey to put misbehaving kids in, and every kid in the school is afraid of her.

The Trunchbull has a discipline ethic that she sums up in a phrase: "Use the rod, beats the child, that is my motto." It is a horrible way of treating children and it makes for a deviously good villain.

Does the Trunchbull's motto sound familiar to you? It is very close to an old saying "spare the rod, spoil the child" which finds its roots in a verse in Proverbs 13: "Whoever spares the rod hates their children. But the one who loves their children is careful to discipline them."

So, the worst villain (in my opinion) is using a variation of a Bible verse as her motto. The Bible verse suggests using a rod if you love your children. Maybe you spanked your kids, maybe you didn't, but either way, taking parenting advice from the Bible is confusing and sometimes problematic.

All of this is to say that parents often feel lost when they are trying to raise their kids. Where do you turn for advice? How do you piece together an ethic for parenting that raises your kids well? How do you discipline your kids so they grow to be independent and strong adults? Parenting techniques and ideas are ever-evolving and



parents have a hard time keeping up with what is best for their kids.

This is what Shanna and I are teaching a parenting class this winter. No one is an expert on parenting (we certainly aren't!), but we think that having honest and open conversations about parenting and sharing tips and techniques can help us to all be

better, more loving parents. Our

hope is to engage in conversation with parents from the church and from the preschool and together to develop some parenting strategies that help us to love our kids well and to raise them to be independent and thriving adults.

The class will run on Monday nights from 6-7p on January 20-February 24th. Childcare is provided and the class is free. If you are interested, signup online or look for a sign up between services in early January! We hope to see you there!

January 10 > Second Friday Night Film Series




Feb 1 > Holland Civic Theatre Outing

Outreach Committee Update



Kids' Food Basket delivers an evening meal, a Sack Supper, each weekday to elementary children (ages 3-12), who experience hunger. Every child served attends a school where, on average,

70% or more of the student population receives free or reduced cost breakfast and lunch. For 17 years, we have grown from serving 125 children at two schools in Kent County to now serving approximately 8,800 children at 52 schools in Kent, Muskegon, Ottawa and Allegan counties.

Poverty is complex, but feeding a child is not. As chief hosts of this important work, we are only able to maximize our impact when we're truly connected to community. Volunteers fuel our mission daily; they sustain the activities of our organization by preparing, packing and delivering the meals. Each day, 30 volunteers come into our Ottawa & Allegan county location to serve over 1,000 kids. We engage individuals, families, organizations and businesses with their time, talent, and treasure. We are truly grateful to have First Presbyterian Church as one of our partners in this important mission.


God needs our gifts of availability, creativity, and humanity to guide us in becoming truly A Place for All, not just a slogan.


We had a generous response to our requests for coats for CAH. We delivered 36 new coats to a very appreciative staff.
