I really appreciated Doug Brouwer's sermon on Transfiguration Sunday (February 14) because he reminded us to "pay attention." Pay attention to all that is around us. One semester I filled in for the religion teacher at Grand Rapids Christian High. I learned so much while presenting her writing lesson called "God Glimpses." Her intent was to instill in the students an awareness of the unexplainable presence of God living with them. Reading those papers written by ninth grade students helped me to open my eyes to the unseen.

Doug said Barbara Brown Taylor was thankful for her gift of curiosity. In many ways, 2020 has not contributed to my curiosity. I was telling Pastor Paul that sometimes my head feels full of cotton, especially when I have been home without having the stimulation of contact with others. Even a good phone conversation or texting does not take the place of personal contact.

The feeling of dullness is more than just lethargy. It is a spiritual lack of attention to all the ways God is at work in this world. One saving moment in my months of inattention is my regular Zoom call with my Spiritual Formation Group. All of us feel more connected to each other and to God when we are done with our verbal examinations of where we have seen God during the month, even though we have not seen one another in person. But it's not the same as sitting around a table and leaving an in-person meeting that closes with a blessing and hugs all around.

I am happy to be able to work inside our church building as well as from home, because every so often I glimpse God at work in the few times I see someone from the staff or from the pre-school or from our time of recording a worship service. I know these occasions are simply little parables of all the ways God is working through each one of us wherever we are at home, work, school, grocery shopping—add your own place where you get a God glimpse. And don't stop paying attention to the "thin places" just because you feel stuck at home with a

Daily Reflections

RACIAL EQUIT

Have you heard the acronym ALICE?

It stands for "Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed."

The United Way and other organizations use this term to describe members of our community who are working but are still unable to make ends meet. Many jobs in Holland (and across the country) do not pay a living wage. The United Way found that 43% of

Michiganders cannot afford basic household needs (even though many of them are employed). While surveying ALICE families, the United way found that among Black households in Michigan, this number was 63% and this number has increased in the past 10 years (up 11% for Black households compared to 1% for Michigan as a whole).

This is staggering information—first that there are so many households who are working and can't afford basic needs, but second that this inequality affects more Black households. As Christians we are called to respond to the injustice we see in the world.

One way that we are responding to this inequity is by participating in the "21 Day Racial Equity Challenge." This is a program that was developed

by Dr. Eddie Moore, Jr., Dr. Marguerite Penick-Parks and was adapted by the Michigan United Way network. The challenge is a daily reflection on readings, videos and podcasts that will help to deepen our understanding of racism and increase our willingness to confront racism when we see it.

Several churches in the area are participating in this challenge together starting on March 1 (it's not too late to join!) with that hope that through expanding our awareness, we will be able to better respond to the injustice and racism around us here in Holland and in the greater Holland area.



The kids made and sent Valentine's Day postcards to some of the seniors and homebound folks at FPC last month and were delighted to receive cards back from some of you!






FPC kids met virtually over Zoom to plant their resurrection gardens.



Our Bible study this season is INTO THE LIGHT: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament.

While it might sound depressing to learn about lament, it has been very interesting to learn about and discuss this subject. We move in March to Lesson #7: Creation Laments.

We have learned about our own laments and disappointments, but more than that, have learned how lament is different from sadness, loss,

and not being together due to disaster/disease. We have been refocused on how to structure and develop a Spiritual Practice in our prayers of lament to God, to remind us of our relationship to God.



"Laments spoken to God are prayers," it said in our Introduction to this study. In Scripture there are many laments "sung, prayed, spoken, painted, danced, or communicated in other ways. Laments bridge the space between our faith in God and the reality of living in our net-yet-redeemed world."

We often hurl our laments at God, asking that "something be done" to fix our problem. There may be some arguing! We describe the grievance

we ascribe to God. We include a statement of trust in God. We call upon God to ACT. We expect that God will hear our petition. All of this keeps us in partnership with God, even when we are struggling. That is much better than going on feeling completely alone.

The Outreach Council is glad to announce that the Holland Area Hunger Coalition is again hosting a CROP Hunger Walk this year to support local and national organizations in working to help our hungry neighbors. First Presbyterian

Church has a long history of supporting the Holland Area CROP Walk.

Because of the on-going COVID 19 situation, walkers can choose to walk in person (while maintaining social distance) or separately.

The CROP Walk is scheduled for Saturday, April 24, starting at Holland Christian H.S. (Ottawa & West 40th) at 8-9a. The Sunday Walk is on April 25, at Beechwood Reformed Church on Ottawa Beach Rd. from 1:30-2:30p.
