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

Linda's Keyboard

I attended a memorial service on Sunday May 23. There had been a small service outside shortly after the death occurred, but this was a service for a wider group of family members who were not able to attend earlier in the COVID shutdown. It was held in a Presbyterian church that has been following the masking/distancing protocols because she and her wife were members of the congregation.

Several people were unmasked when I entered the sanctuary, all of them not members of the congregation. The church itself was set up as it is when the congregation is worshiping on Sunday—every other row empty, distance between small groups of people, well ventilated. I thought the pastor handled it gently when she announced how much the congregation appreciated those who followed the masking guidelines, but she did not dismiss anyone unmasked.

We are entering a strange time in our efforts to come back together as a congregation. Wearing masks or no masks? Singing or not? Passing the peace by shaking hands or in some other way? Serving cookies from a tray or handing them out individually wrapped? And that is just a description of worship in the parking lot. How will we be able to move to more freedom inside the sanctuary?

I am sure we all have questions, but I am grateful that session has made a plan to move ahead. Plans can change, but for now it has been refreshing to worship outside, able to sing our glorious hymns, hear the choir, and participate in responsive readings. My favorite is the eye contact not available on a recording.

Our reopening plan did not address funerals in the church. Pastor Paul and I have always been available for a graveside or Memorial Garden service with a small attendance, but we have several families who are waiting for a gathering to celebrate a life and witness to the resurrection. The session will be discussing our need for memorial services. We already have guidelines for "normal" times, but we need to rethink how we can adjust those to accommodate the current situation in our congregation.

Re-wiring Our Brains

There is an excellent Youtube channel called *Smarter Every Day* where the host, Destin, explores science topics in interesting ways.

One of his most watched videos is called The Backwards Brain Bicvcle. In the video, a welder friend of his has created a backwards bicycle using some simple gears. The bicycle turns left when you steer right and right when you steer left. This bike is almost impossible to

ride. Destin has lots of people try to ride it and no-one can do it.

Riding a bike is easy to do once you learn how, but relearning on the backwards bike is really difficult. Destin says in the video, "Once you have a rigid way of thinking in your head, sometimes you cannot change that even if you want to."

He was talking about the bike, but I think this is a valuable lesson for all of us. We are often stuck in our rigid ways of thinking, and even if we want to change it is incredibly difficult.

Destin, determined to conquer the backwards bike, spent 8 months learning to ride it. He got pretty good at it, But then something odd happened—he tried to ride a regular bike again (on the streets of Amsterdam) and he couldn't do it. He had rewired his brain and it took him some time to be able to ride a normal bike again.

This past year has been a season of "re-wiring" for our brains. We had done church the same way for years and years, but this past year forced us to re-learn what it

means to be a church and how to worship together. I think this is good—it is good to expand beyond our rigid ways of thinking.

> But also, as we move toward meeting in the building again and returning to some kind of normalcy, we may have some trouble getting going again. There will be some things that have changed, there will be things that need to change. There may be some difficulty as we re-learn how to

be a church. This is normal.

Though this past year has been hard, it has helped us grow. We have learned to do church in a pandemic and as we re-learn church, let's keep our hearts and minds open to the new ways that we can be the love and light of Jesus Christ in the world.

One of the mandates for the Outreach
Council of First Presbyterian Church is
to find ways for our church members to
get involved. A group of volunteers from First Pres
recently attended a training at the First United

Methodist Church to assist with the *Refresh* program
that is hosted there in collaboration with the
Community Action House.

The Refresh program provides showers, counseling services, food, clothing, and a respite from the daily grind for our neighbors who are currently experiencing homelessness. As a drop-in center, Refresh: Hygiene and Hope also provides mail services, allowing visitors to receive important mail. One of the major barriers to successfully navigating available community resources is valid ID, and a place to receive official documents

through the mail is a bridge to achieving documentation. Coffee, snacks, free wifi, and access to the

internet are also included. CAH's Homeless Outreach Specialists who are an integral part of the program trained in addressing and navigating the challenges of homelessness will be onsite. The program runs on Tuesday and Friday mornings and Wednesday evenings throughout the year. Thanks to everyone who has participated in our self-study survey and discussion groups over the past few weeks. If you have not yet completed the survey, please make time to do so before Saturday, June 5. You can complete your survey online HERE or return the paper copy you received in the mail to the church office. Everyone's input is important.

The Mission Study team is currently working on compiling survey results and will share the final report with the congregation when it is complete.

The next step in our transition process will be selection of a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). The Nominating Committee invites nominations from the congregation of folks who will be able to represent our

congregation in selecting a new head pastor. Please submit your nominations by Sunday, June 27 in the box that will be in the church office and at the outdoor services in June, or email names to pastor@fpcholland.org.

Please talk to people to ensure that they are willing to serve on the PNC before you submit their names. Questions about the commitment or the process can be directed to Rev. Linda Male, Paula Perkins, or Lauren Stouffer. The Nominating Committee will meet at the end of June to select a PNC with a goal of including people who represent various demographic groups at FPC. Those nominees will be presented and elected at a special congregational meeting.



In the Beginning





As we begin the process of selecting and welcoming a new Head of Staff, let's take a look back at our history to remember how we have become this congregation in this place. Chris Urbaniak will be our "history tour guide."

Back in 1957, the Methodist Church in downtown Holland was thinking of expanding their building. Some members felt it would be better to build a second church in another location. There was enough support for that idea that a canvas was made for a suitable site which turned out to be the Brooks' property at 28th and State Street; a deposit was made to secure an option. By now, some 30 families were interested. However, the Methodist Board of Extension decided to postpone the idea for two years. This disappointed the group which then contacted Dr. Frederick Wyngarden of Westminster Church in Grand Rapids who was on the Presbytery committee for church extension to see if it would be possible to organize a Presbyterian church. Soon, an ad was run to announce plans and welcome all who were interested. The first worship service was held March 15, 1958, in the Brooks' house, which was under option to purchase. A steering committee was formed, and after

meeting with Synod and other Presbyterian officials, the State Street property was purchased. A petition bearing 100 signatures was sent to Presbytery asking that the church be organized, and it was incorporated on June 26, 1958. A formal service of organization by the Presbytery was held June 29 at Western Seminary Chapel. 102 people came that night to accept their responsibility as members. Sunday school classes were organized, elders and deacons were elected, and a choir was formed, along with the Women's Association and Boy Scout Troop 147. After hearing many guest ministers, a call went out to the Rev. Bernard Vanderbeek to be the first pastor; he was installed September 24, 1958. A Kimball organ was purchased, and a children's program was organized with volunteers building furniture for a nursery. Two services were held due to the small seating capacity of the Brooks' house (or mansion as it was called). Session authorized the purchase of the property for \$37,500. The first class of new members was received, and the annual report showed that 105 charter members had increased to a total membership of 137.

The congregation met in that large home until 1961, when they broke ground for a chapel-fellowship hall while still keeping Christian Education and offices in the home. As we grew, it was decided, because of costs, to expand the chapel-fellowship hall and tear down the Mansion. The church has stayed on the same property changing and/or adding on to the original chapel-fellowship hall building ever since.

Three names were considered when the church was being formed: State Street, Westminster, and First. The children's program was immediately organized to guide the young people. Members made benches and tables; classes began in June with Bob Jacobusse as Sunday School Superintendent. The first choir was a junior choir. Much of the alterations, maintenance, and custodial work were done by volunteers to make the Brooks' house a suitable church home.

One hurdle to overcome is the after service meal. Will we limit it to finger food or cookies? Some people prefer a luncheon. Let's talk and see how we can move ahead to support grieving families while keeping everyone safe.

Christians are social people and need to live in community with both God and others. That piece is missing to a great degree during the pandemic. We pray that whatever looks different as we go forward, it will not mean losing community.
