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

Welcome Back! A Place For All Construction/Renovation

Nearly 2 years after construction on our *A Place For All* began, everything is now complete. Our goals for the renovation were to improve physical and psychological access to all parts of our facility — including the lower level; to improve safety, security, and technology; and to provide a more efficient use of existing space.

As we re-enter and occupy our facility after the Covid-19 Pandemic pause, here is the list of the new and different completed components:

- New north entrance with exterior canopy for sheltered drop-off
- Elevator to lower level and narthex; access ramp to chancel and improved access to choir loft
- Expanded narthex reducing bottlenecks and improving circulation
- South entrance and stair with new windows on exterior wall making access to the lower level more inviting
- Enhanced security and technology
- Arts and worship room room for choir robes and sink for communion prep
- New and refurbished movable partitions in lower level to improve flexible space



- New light panels behind the stained glass windows in sanctuary to replace the natural light lost in the new construction
- Addition of a Mission and Outreach kiosk to highlight the work of our community partners and volunteer opportunities
- Fresh furnishings including new carpet, lighting, and paint in renovated areas
- Worship Centers relocated to be together in the lower level, simplifying drop-off and pick-up for families
- Renovated Fellowship Hall with new flooring, including a prayer labyrinth
- New Family Restroom in lower level with accessible toilet, shower, washer and dryer
- Renovated men's and women's bathrooms in lower level
- Improved storage area for Boy Scouts

We look forward to the opportunities that our renovated facility provides to support both community activities and church program functions.

It's also important to remember that the areas renovated are **Phase I** of the master plan prepared for us by Cornerstone Architects. Areas not part of Phase I include the parking lot and storage building, sanctuary, staff office area, lighting in all non-renovated areas, and the south entry steps and porch.

We want to thank everyone for your participation and support in the needs assessment, planning process, and during the construction phase.



As we begin the process of selecting and welcoming a new Head of Staff, let's take a look back at our history to remember how we have become this congregation in this place.

Chris Urbaniak will be our "history tour guide."



First Presbyterian Church 1958 - 2008

For First Presbyterian Church's 50th Anniversary celebration, the Anniversary Committee decided to find an appropriate logo for our church as a symbol of the anniversary. We selected the mythical Sankofa (Sang-ko-fah) bird, inspired by the philosophical principle of the Akan people of West Africa called Sankofa, which says that in order to move into the future, one must go back and learn from the past. The Sankofa bird symbolizes this philosophy by flying forward with its head facing backward and holding an egg in its beak to symbolize the future. The committee felt the Sankofa bird symbolized the desire of First Presbyterian Church members to celebrate our past, gathering the best of what it has to teach us, so that we can achieve our full potential as we move enthusiastically into our future. The logo was designed by long time church member Judy Giles.

In the Beginning #3

- On June 29, 1958, a formal service of organization by the Presbytery was held at Western Seminary Chapel, and 102 people accepted their responsibility.
- The Brooks' property was purchased for \$37,500.
- Due to the small seating capacity, it was necessary to have two services, one in the morning and one in the evening.
- Deacons and Deaconesses were elected as 2 different groups, but were soon united as women were eligible to hold church offices. They acted as head ushers and arranged rides for Hope students wishing to attend in addition to their present duties.
- A Women's Association was formed on June 30th.
- The music committee arranged for the purchase of a Kimball organ.
- Guest ministers were used until the first minister, Rev. Dr. Bernard E.
 Vanderbeek of Charleston, West Virginia, was installed September 24, 1958.
- In November, a Boy Scout troop was organized and met in the garage
- The year-end report noted that 105 charter members had increased to a total of 137.
- In 1959, a manse at 555 College Avenue was purchased.
- A building committee was formed to plan new construction of a church.
- Year end membership totaled 195, and receipts were \$29,702.

Sewing New Stoles // 35 New stoles are being created to replace our blue choir robes. Each stole has 6 parts which had to be cut from fabric. That's 210 pieces! The concept, design, and purchase of material was led by Lois Rodgers and Janet Brashler from Worship Council, Nick Norris provided the photos for the artwork, and Wendy Dillingham stepped up to help with planning the cutting, fusing, counting, sewing, clipping, counting, trimming, pressing, measuring, counting. Volunteers met on 2 Saturdays and hauled in their sewing machines, ironing boards and irons, loaned tools and equipment, sent and brought treats, loaded and unloaded cars, moved tables and chairs, and probably other helpful acts.
