I have not met as many of the congregation as I would have during times of regular activities at the church, but the ones I now know impress me as being very committed to the ministry of God here at FPC.

I celebrate —

- . Five professions of faith by our youth
- Seven members added by transfer or reaffirmation of faith It was fun and joyful to meet with the adult new members, to hear their faith stories, and to introduce them to some of the elders and their work in the Councils of Session. To add new members during a time of building shutdown and online or outdoor services only is a work of the Holy Spirit.

A Note from Rev. Paul Van Kempen

When I wrote my annual report for 2020, I wrote about how we would always think of time as BC (Before Covid) and AC (After Covid), I didn't anticipate that we would spend another year living during Covid!

As I reflect on this past year, it seems that there were three distinct phases and each phase had its challenges and blessings. Let me elaborate:

Phase 1: Worshiping totally online. At the beginning of 2021, we were still worshiping totally virtually. We would record the service on Thursday and release it on Sunday. Many of us gathered around TVs and computers to worship in our own homes. Nick Norris took over the recording and editing duties and we were treated to creativity in music and video editing for several months. The challenges of staying connected and living as a community were still present (as they were in 2020)

Phase 2: Worship outside. We continued recording the service, but we also began gathering outside in the parking lot for worship. These Sundays were some of my favorite ones from this past year. We got to sing some of the congregation's favorite hymns, we listened to the kids playing on the playground, and we worked together each week to set up and tear down our sanctuary under the open sky. It wasn't all easy. Inclement weather and high heat made some services difficult to sit through. It was a blessing to see people in person, however, and it was nice to be outside enjoying the fresh air.

Phase 3: Worshiping inside and live streaming. This fall we came back inside our building. Many of us hadn't spent much time in the newly renovated space and it was nice to enjoy it together. We sat in our old spots, we listened to our wonderful choir, things felt a little more normal. We also began live-streaming which was another technical hurdle that was difficult to overcome. *Continued on page 6*

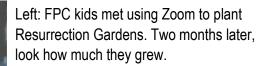

Transportation

Session approved \$25,000 for the purchase of a newer replacement bus to include seat belts and arm rests for safety and comfort of riders. We bought the 2014 bus from a dealership in Long Island, NY, made a few minor repairs for a total of \$27,838, sold our original bus for \$8,500 which brought us under the original approval amount. The bus was driven to Holland by Lori Klinesteker, Cassie Kregger, Lauren Stauffer, and Chris Urbaniak at their own expense (and their own fun experience).

Our 2002 bus has moved on to support another good service organization. The American Legion Honor Guard of Saginaw purchased it on November 15th. We had many interested parties (churches, tours, an individual large family), but they were one of the first to contact us and offer to purchase. They are as excited as we were 3 years ago when we acquired it from Escape Ministries. This bus has enjoyed a long life of service!

Presbyterian Women

Our highlight photo is from our box-lunch picnic in June! We met outdoors due to COVID and we look relaxed and happy to see each other. We did some planning for 2021-22. This fall, we had a Bible study kickoff with Rev. Linda Male to introduce the study about the few women of Jesus' lineage mentioned during the "begats" in Matthew 1, and we donated to the PW denominational Birthday Offering. Our two study Circles meet once a month, and have 20-30 people involved. Our study of Lament was helpful, but we are certainly enjoying this new study led by an Australian theologian and teacher. Her laughter is therapeutic.

We held off on electing a new Coordinating Team until we know more about where COVID is heading, but have a 4 member planning group. One circle is meeting either as an in-person hybrid with a Zoom option, and it is moving to Zoom only until April 2022. The other circle carefully meets in person. We continue our pledge support to the Presbytery of Lake Michigan Presbyterian Women, and donate to Least Coin, an international prayer ministry of women. In November, we began collecting new and unwrapped underwear for women and children helped by RESILIENCE, having fled domestic abuse situations with very little.

We agreed that our annual \$1,000 support to our Presbyterian Preschool should continue, despite not working for Tulip Time in costume for the past two years. We may need to do some creative fundraising projects in the near future!

As some of our older members have moved into long term care or cannot get out anymore, we attempt to keep them close with cards, visits, and calls. We hope the hybrid option can expand by having a dedicated computer where we meet in the Michigan Room. Embracing technology in new ways may be our way to continued viability.





Mission and Outreach Council

2021 has been a rich year of both financial support and volunteer involvement even in the middle of a pandemic. FPC continued to be generous with their contributions, allowing the Outreach Council to support local and world-wide causes.

Highlights were responding to local needs as they were assessed. For example, while working at Refresh, a need arose for backpacks that we were able to purchase for persons temporarily experiencing homelessness. The urgent need for housing in Holland led to contributions to local agencies working specifically to help persons remain in or find housing.

We strive to have persons from the congregation involved in all of our partner agencies. Recently a friend of the ACTS program, commented about how much they appreciate how FPC not only supports them financially, but also is willing to get involved with their programs.

We sent \$20,000 to the General Assembly and the Presbytery in their mission efforts. Locally, we distributed nearly \$38,000 to our partner agencies and other agencies that share our philosophies & meet vital needs in our community. This year we sent money to Good Samaritan, Resilience, Community Action House, Children's Advocacy Center, Kids' Food Basket, Out on the Lakeshore, Escape Ministries, Holland Free Clinic, ACTS, 70 times 7, Habitat for Humanity, Refresh: Hygiene & Hope, Lighthouse Immigrant Advocates, & Fit Kids H2O. In addition, we support the FPC Preschool program with scholarship money. As the year ended, we collected coats in November for Children's Advocacy and hats, gloves & mittens in December for several agencies.

The Outreach Council's mission is to act as Christ's heart & hands in helping those in need. We try to discern God's direction so that we may model the Kingdom of God. Thank you FPC for your generosity and for allowing us to represent you in this mission.



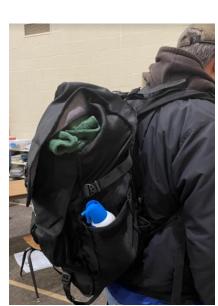

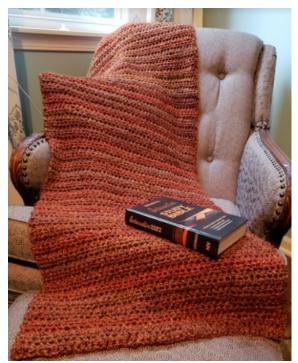

Connections Council

"The church is not a building; the church is not a steeple. The church is not a resting place; the church is the people." In tribute to this old verse, in 2021, our council worked to stay connected with "the people" of First Presbyterian Church in whatever methods possible during pandemic conditions.

One goal this year was to send personal notes to all identified new visitors to our Sunday services and to members with prayer concerns. At Sunday services held in the parking area, whenever possible, we worked to greet those attending services, helped them find necessary seating outside, and provided bulletins and hymnals for those new to FPC or members first returning to services, etc. This work continued when services moved inside as we tried to help members and visitors alike feel welcome, and we assisted the ushers with new seating practices when needed. When indoor services become "more normal" once again, we plan to return to past practice and seek out congregational volunteers to serve as greeters on Sunday mornings.

More visible were our connections through celebrations. At the Outdoor Discovery Center service in August designated as our time together to honor retiring Pastor Linda Knerieman, we assisted in sending invitations to those who had served on her Nominating Committee. More noticeable on that Sunday was after the service, when, with the assistance of Diane Hayes (food service queen of FPC), Peggy Purdy (with her M&M Cafe expertise) and several other FPC members, we purchased and served treats and beverages as a retirement reception.

The Connections Council also provided congregational treats after two outdoor services in the fall, one being on Fall Kick-Of Sunday. (Once again, we appreciated the assistance of many other FPC members on those mornings.)

One final expenditure/action of our council was the purchase of a new refrigerator as a replacement in the M & M cafe. The old one, still working but too small, was moved closer to the offices, providing added convenience for staff members and folks using

our building

In taking these steps in 2021, the Connections Council worked toward the FPC quest of making everyone feel comfortable, welcome, and honored at FPC. As Jesus said (Matthew 10:40): "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me."



Business and Building Council

In 2021, the Building and Business council worked on a couple of projects that you won't likely see, but they surround you in the building.

In the past few years, we have been reporting that our many furnaces are aging and 2021 saw the failure of the heating/air conditioning unit for the main office. This was replaced but expect this furnace to be a topic of concern over the next few years; we have only replaced about half of the units in the building.

2021 also saw upgrades to our information technology infrastructure. In 2020, our fire wall was replaced and in 2021, our router switch and entire wireless network were upgraded.

WIFI in the building was previously handled by 5 different residential grade access points. This project saw the installation of 6 commercial grade access points that allow movement through the building without losing your connections. The new network has increased speed, better building coverage, and increased bandwidth. The increased capacity is being used every Sunday now as we send out a live stream broadcast directly to this new network.

Another technology upgrade is the migration of the office computers to Office365. This will increase productivity and allow for cloud-based storage that will obsolete the aging network server that is being used for storage but does not have proper backup capability.

We have continued to work on locating the sources of roof leaks. In the heavy rains this fall, we appeared to only have one leak and the location was addressed. Hopefully the 2022 spring rains will all stay out of the building.

The use of the building since March of 2020 has been limited; hopefully, we will be able to greater utilize the recently constructed space in 2022. I invite and encourage participation in the Building and Business council from anyone who is excited about the recent building changes and interested in imagining what we can do to further enhance the building.

2021 Scouting Year in Review

Where was God most apparent?

God was most apparent with keeping our leadership, both youth and adult, working as a cohesive team with all the challenges that Covid has thrown our way. With God's guidance and support, we continued the Scouts BSA program with many challenges and even more successes. Our Troop, as supported by First Presbyterian Church, continues to offer a quality program that engages youth with opportunities to grow. This all results from God's guidance and love.

What was the highlight of the year?

We had 98% participation in summer camp from the Scouts. They all had a great time even with some changes for Covid. Our Scouts earned 62 merit badges at summer camp and left with a number of partials that are being completed with our very supportive adult leadership, both within Troop 147 and from other scouters in the area.

How did you respond to the changes and challenges from Covid

We changed our meetings to be outside, when possible, which the Scouts absolutely love. As the weather changes, and the days are shorter, we are back to meeting inside with safety conscious precautions thanks to our sponsor. We creatively met in ways and places to keep all the Scouts as engaged as possible with the various COVID restrictions in place. The other challenge we have had is our main source of Troop fundraising, parking cars at Tulip Time, has been unavailable for two years now. The Troop remains a good steward of the funds and have been able to keep running with our current funding. We remain hopeful that Tulip Time Parking returns for 2022, as that provides enough to support our Troop. *Continued on page 20*

What did you learn?

To lead with grace and understanding in the midst of many adults holding (as seen throughout society) differing views on the impact of COVID, and that Michigan Crossroads Council has a wavering, fluid position on COVID that makes it challenging to chart a course as their standards continue to change with little discussion or warning. But we continue to engage our Scouts, providing a safe, fun, rewarding program that benefits the Scouts. We also confirmed our belief that the Scouts are very resilient and roll with the changes we all experience. Scouts look for a rational solid guide, and we are endeavoring to provide that foundation, with enough flexibility to still engage and let them be children having fun. That focus – developing leaders in a fun environment – continues to guide our Scouts BSA program: We are here for the Scouts.

What is your hope for the future?

To keep engaging more boys through robust recruiting and a very active program, highlighting exciting adventures appropriate for those 11-18 years old. We also fully support starting a girl Troop this next year if we can recruit the required 5 youth.

IMPACT OF THE MINISTRY IN 2021

Number of people involved: an average of 25 Scouts registered and nearly all "active" in the program on a weekly basis. We have about 35 registered adults and approximately 20 as truly "active" in the program. (18)Rank Advancements, including (2) Eagle Scouts (107) Merit Badges earned (11) other Awards



Sea Base

People served: The Scouts are served on a regular basis through the active adults in the Troop and our local community. Equally important, Troop 147 serves the greater Holland community through numerous service projects such as our Eagle projects (Harbor Humane and Outdoor Discovery Center), Toys for Tots assistance, assisting the Michigan DNR (State Park preparation), and community events such as parades, cemetery flag placements, National Night Out, Sportsmen for Youth, holiday festival support, and other activities.

Number of events held: 30 events (camping, hiking, service projects, high adventure camps, summer camp), plus regular Troop meetings.

- · Service Hours: 347 for greater Holland
- · Camping Nights (Tent): 635
- Hiking Miles: 1430
- High Adventure events: Sea Base, Florida (12 participants) for 7 days in June; and Philmont Scout Ranch, New Mexico (11 participants) for 16 days in July.
- Summer Camp at Cole Canoe Base, Michigan (20 participants) for 7 days in July.
- (5) Eagle Courts of Honor held in 2021. Troop 147 now has 149 Eagles on its rolls.

Total amounts raised - \$363.35

Total number of people impacted: numerous, but not tracked

Growth or decrease since previous year: The Troop is smaller in 2021 as compared with just 2 years ago. This results from numerous challenges, including the inability to recruit at schools, fewer Cub Scout Packs (COVID caused a termination of many) to recruit from coupled with a decline in scouting overall (national negative press from lawsuits/bankruptcy impact, plus with many other youth-focused activities available to choose from), and 6 scouts aging out (18 years old).

Way Forward: Adult and scout leadership is focusing heavily on expanding a positive social media presence, highlighting the benefits of Scouts BSA in developing youth and community involvement. We also are inserting more "Den Chiefs," Scouts who assist a Cub Scout Den directly, into the few remaining Holland-area Cub Scout Packs to highlight the robust nature of Troop 147 which remains one of the most active "outdoor" troops in Holland, something many Cub Scout parents look for.

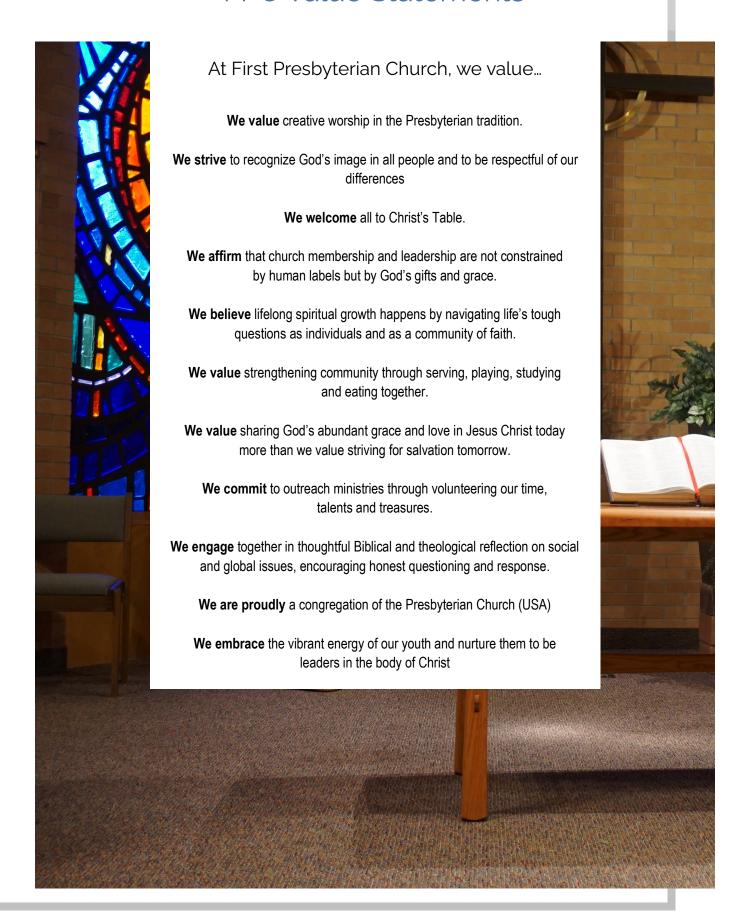
