

Deacons' Caring Corner

During Life at First on Sunday, May 22, the Deacons presented information about the work of their four Care Teams: Transportation, Handy workers, Nourishers, and Comforters. The congregation was invited to play a role in the work of Deacons by making themselves available to help the teams. Several people signed up to help, but more are always appreciated.

Copies of the bulletin insert from Sunday include photos of the deacons, the teams they are involved with, and a brief narrative of the care services provided. Extra copies of the insert are available from the church office.

Deacons have begun a discussion about how they can provide access to certain devices to aid in the recovery of patients following surgery or injury. Items such as canes, crutches, walkers and knee scooters, bedside commodes, and ice packs/ice machines are on a list of supplies. These would not all be stored at church, but there will be a system of lending, retrieving, and storing with individuals who own the devices. This system is another way to support the work of the Care Teams. Watch for more information or contact the Deacons at deacons@fpcholland.org if you are willing to lend equipment to others.

Deacons desire help from the congregation. Signing up to bring a meal or send a card or make a phone call or drive someone to an appointment is a sharing of the ministry here at First Presbyterian Church. Within that same theme, self-exploration led me to try drawing, then writing and found that to be very satisfying. Next came sculpture, repurposing old things into new items

that became garden art, much to the amusement of neighbors. Now, quite recently, it is mosaics; repurposing discards from other people.

Motivating factors were drawn from a combination of inspiration and avoidance behavior; "If you don't find something to do, you can vacuum and dust the living room." (Speaker requests anonymity.)

Precision is not part of my nature. What could be compatible with my motto that, "Close is good enough."

Hence, these items emerged from how-to YouTube videos, inexpensive materials (dishes from Bibles for Mexico resale shop), glue, Masonite and grout. It is an endeavor in progress.
