INVITATION

Message from the Outreach Council // It's Fall and with Fall comes the return of winter clothing drives to help keep our friends & neighbors in Holland warm. November will be for used and new coats, December for hats, scarves, gloves & mittens, and January for blankets.

Our receiving agencies are ones that we partner with through Outreach Council. New coats (sizes youth 4/5 to adult L) will be given to Children's Advocacy Center. Used coats of all sizes will go to Community Action House and the Refresh program for persons experiencing homelessness.

Here's a brief update from Children's Advocacy Center to show you what they are doing and the need in our community. Over the past year we have:

- provided 405 forensic interviews (these are done after a child discloses abuse)
- Conducted 95 forensic medical exams
- provided 1,726 therapy sessions
- conducted 60 problematic sexual behavior screenings
- trained more than 15,000 adults and children in body safety (this school year we are projecting over 16,000 kids trained in body safety and allowing for a safe person and place to disclose what may be happening to them)

There will be bins clearly marked as used & new to receive coats during the month of November. As you clean out your closets for the winter, share the coats you haven't worn and add a new coat to your shopping cart to help with kids in need. Thank you for your generosity. ~ Outreach Council
