Living Together as Community

Living together as a community of faith isn't always easy. Even the healthiest of families have their conflicts, so it isn't any wonder that churches (and denominations) also have their internal struggles. Moments of tension can also be moments of clarity, opportunities to examine what it is we believe, and how we will live out that faith in public.

But let's be honest, we would much prefer it if we could all get along all the time.

Fortunately, the gospel accounts of Jesus' own life remind us that his life was not without conflict. The truth of his life and the complexities of his teachings made some uncomfortable, made others angry.

Recently, our Session (active ruling elders) engaged in a conversation about providing space for Out on the Lakeshore's Drag Storytime event. (Please visit OOTL.org for more information about this advocacy organization which FPC supports.) I invited LGBTQ+ members and parents of LGBTQ+ individuals to the conversation since our current session is composed of straight, cis-gender individuals.

We met with Kate Leighton-Colburn, OOTL's executive director to learn what a drag story time is and what it isn't. We learned about the purpose of drag story time (literacy and diversity), the safety protocols, and the performer (who grew up in Holland). We prayed and we listened. The opinions varied from deeply supportive to intensely opposed. In the end, the vote was not unanimous, but the event moved forward. The event moved forward peacefully and without protests or chaos.

The event moved forward, providing families who wanted to participate an opportunity to do so in a safe environment.

I am sorry to share that two elders and one deacon felt the need to resign over this decision, but I also want you to hear the truth that one of our LGBTQ individuals shared, "This is actually the first time in my life that I have felt that a faith community respected LGBTQ folks enough to trust that this extremely marginalized minority community can make

Survey Results

This summer, over the course of three sermons, I introduced the topic of my DMin thesis to the congregation and asked for your help by filling out a survey. 100 of you (yes, exactly 100—it makes percentages so easy!) filled out the survey. Here are some preliminary thoughts on what we can learn from the survey.

Take away #1: We are concerned about climate change.

84% of you were “worried” or “very worried” about Climate Change. This is higher than the national average of 58% by a large margin.

Take away #2: We aren’t *that* concerned about Climate Change.

One of the key factors that causes individuals and organizations to act on Climate Change is how acutely that individual or organization feels the effects of the Climate changing. Only 47% of you thought that climate change would harm you personally. We are broadly concerned about Climate Change, but we don’t necessarily worry about its effect on us as individuals.

Take away #3: We are concerned about the future of the Church.

57% of you are “worried” or “very worried” about the future of the Global Church. We are more worried about the Climate than we are about the church, which I think says something about our faithfulness as followers of Christ and our deep concern for the climate.

Take away #4: We aren’t that concerned about the future of this church.

Only 29% of you were “worried” or “very worried” about the future of FPC Holland. (Only 4 of you were “very worried”!) Does this mean we are confident in the mission and vision of FPC Holland? Or does it mean that we aren’t yet feeling the effects of the church crisis in our home church?

Take away #5: We have a wide array of definitions, and perspectives on the American Dream.

While there were some clear trends in the data about the Climate and Church, our thoughts on the American Dream are all over the map. Many of you think the American Dream has been of benefit to you as individuals and the country. Others think it has caused harm to the country and the climate. We have a lot to unpack here, which is great!

This year during the education hour, in our council meetings, through book groups, and special guests we will explore these topics further. I can’t wait to keep learning with all of you!

September 20th at 9:30am in the Michigan Room

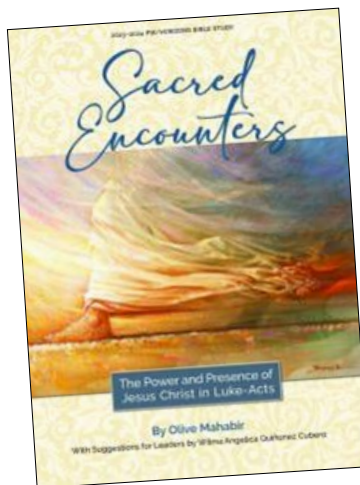

Each subsequent lesson provides deeper insight into familiar stories we know from Luke and Acts. The Bible scripture passage is printed in each lesson. This study was written by the Rev. Dr. Olive Mahabir, an ordained Presbyterian minister, who is "passionate about theological education and believes that learning can happen at any time and in any context." Her bio is on page 2 of the study book. The special art for each lesson was done by different artists.

A little history here! This idea began in 1888, in Springfield, Ohio, when Eliza Clokey asked each woman to give one dollar over and above her usual contribution to the Women's General Missionary Society of the United Presbyterian Church of North America. A century later when two denominations combined as the PC(USA), the newly formed Presbyterian Women organization adopted the Thank Offering as one of the two grant making programs of the national organization. Since then, more than 1,600 different projects in the U.S. and around the world have benefitted from this little act of generosity. Just think what the vision and leadership of one single woman have accomplished!



Envelopes for this Thank Offering will be in the narthex on the PW shelf and in class study meetings. We hope you will consider your support of Presbyterian Women by your Mission and Least Coin offerings during each class. Hear these words from one of your siblings in Christ: “extremely marginalized minority,” and try to imagine that sense of exclusion. As God’s own, welcomed into God’s arms by God’s very mercy and grace, let us continue to labor to bring down the barriers and boundaries that cause people to lose hope in God’s love. God’s heart will always be tender toward the oppressed.

And because it needs to be said, resist the labeling of drag story time performers as groomers and pedophiles since there is no data to support this misinformation. The painful reality is that there are people of every gender and sexual orientation who are dangerous to children and youth.

As a new Deacon, I was assigned to head up the FPC Transporters Team of 10 volunteers. The team was formed to help FPC Holland members and their families whose circumstances don't allow them to drive or find other means of transportation to shop, travel to medical appointments and church services, etc.

Deacon Nancy Staal, a member of the deacon's Comforters Care Team, recently visited longtime member Jo Ann Karn who is living at a skilled care facility known as SKLD of Zeeland. Nancy found that Jo Ann is wheelchair bound and thus unable to get out of her wheelchair to use a walker, much less get into a regular car, van, or bus. Nancy also learned that Jo Ann very much misses attending our church and seeing her many friends there.

My first thought was to arrange for our wheelchair accessible church bus to add a stop in Zeeland and pick up and drop off Jo Ann as part of their Sunday morning route. But that couldn't be done without completely disrupting the schedule and making all the people who depend on the bus late for church!

So, a plan B was developed. Chris Urbaniak agreed to drive the bus, with myself as a passenger, to SKLD Zeeland on a weekday afternoon to get Jo Ann and take her to FPC Holland. Jo Ann had never seen the new construction and additions to the building and had never met either of our pastors Paul Van Kempen and Cathy Hoop.

Plan B was executed on July 13. It was a heart-warming success, as seen in the photos. I'm told that Jo Ann still raves about what a great time she had that afternoon. So did I and everyone else involved in the event!

Deacons "Care Closet" // Deacons continue to add medical devices to a "care closet" for the congregation to borrow on a temporary basis. The concept is for the lender to retain the device until needed and deacons will handle the transfer.

Devices available so far include two knee scooters, a variety of walkers, a narrow wheelchair, bath bench, and a metal form to assist in putting on compression socks. More items are needed including canes and crutches.
