## The American Dream

As part of my work for my DMin class (stay tuned for more updates and opportunities in the coming months!) I have been doing some reading to try to make sense of the connections between the Church, Climate Change, and the American Dream. The American Dream (the idea that you can prosper if you work hard enough and that your kids will be better off than you were) has been a guiding principle in the US for decades *and* it has shaped the theology and practice of the church.

One of the core principles of the American Dream is unlimited growth. There is always a possibility for *more* in the American Dream. This has been a pain point for the church for the past 40-50 years as the church has been in steady decline. We are trained to look for growth for health and stability, and watching the church shrink has been hard for Christians to make sense of.

Bill McKibben, a climate writer and Christian, has a lovely perspective on the decline of the American church. He writes about it in his book, *The Flag, The Cross, and the Station Wagon.* He says: "It is crazy to try and base a culture or a government on the Gospels because they are too hard. Insisting that you're doing so can only mean squashing reversing—the clear meaning of the words. But that doesn't mean the Gospels can't be a potent force. They can be—but only as an outside force" (133).

I love this sentiment. The Church used to be the driving force of the culture. It is easy for us to long for that to be the case once again. But McKibben makes the salient point that the church was never meant to be the center of culture—it was meant to be a radical counterculture. In our decline we have been better positioned to be a voice for change. As outsiders, we can speak truth to the culture and politics shaping our nation. We don't have as much power as we once did, but as Christ-Followers and outsiders, our voice has more authenticity than ever, and there is real value in that.

The Church looks different than it did when I was a kid (and from when you were a kid too), and that isn't something to be afraid of, it is an opportunity to reframe our engagement with the world. Let's be scrappy, radical, outsiders, ready to speak truth to the culture around us. Who knows what God will do through this place!

The Session of FPC held its regular meeting on January 16<sup>th</sup>, opening with a devotion by Gail Hering, who acknowledged and celebrated the work of our outgoing elders. The outgoing elders (Linda Clark, Sherry Martens, Tim Staal, and Amy Vandermeer) were invited to share their thoughts about their time on the session and offer their ideas for future work. The new elders (Cassie Kregger, Bill Evenson, Jen Laux-Ludwig, Ben Rund-Scott, Tom Salley, Dave Zessin) were welcomed to the meeting as non-voting members. (They were ordained and/or installed on January 21.)

Moving forward, the Buildings and Business Council will be split back into two councils: Finance and Buildings, with separate chairs for each. The amount of work required to keep the building maintained and manage the finances of the church is simply too much work for one council. Dave Zessin and Bill Evenson will serve on Finance, and Jon McFadyen will continue as chair of Buildings.

We are also considering changing the name of the Connections council to "Fellowship" or

"Hospitality," as a better description of the council's responsibilities.

As the elders continue to envision what church "post-covid" looks like, we are going to read a book together. For next month, we are sampling the first chapter of *Sailboat Church* by Joan Gray. The basic premise is that most churches struggle, rowing the boat along, rather than allowing the Holy Spirit to fill a church's sails and guide it into the future. Of course, even guiding a sailboat requires much thought and planning!

Good news: The Buildings council is planning for upgrades to our sound system for the sanctuary. The first step will be the purchase of new microphones, as ours are almost beyond repair. We are also grateful for an anonymous gift to the congregation which will make this improvement possible.

Bob Knittel was re-elected as treasurer, and Lori Klinesteker was re-elected as clerk. We are deeply grateful for their tireless service.

The meeting was closed with prayer.
