Jesus' birth is a story for all ages. But Easter is much more complicated. We have to filter the Easter story for the young. They don't need the details of Jesus' suffering and execution. They don't need to try to understand Jesus' anguish, or the anguish of those who loved him. They don't need to be weighed down by the world's injustices...not vet.

But we do. As people of faith, as followers of a rabbi and healer who was tortured and executed, we need to understand the realities of the path we have chosen to walk. There will be promises fulfilled, but there will also be trials. There will be miracles along the way, but there will also be heartache. This life of faith is rarely a walk in the park, and that seems especially true now. We are confronted with difficult choices: sacrifice or comfort? Engagement or passivity? Will we be the good Samaritan? Will we be the forgiving father? Will we be the one who seeks that missing lamb? These choices take energy, imagination, intelligence and love. Jesus isn't looking for martyrs, but he is trusting us to live into the fullness of God's vision for a world in which compassion and mercy are the default rather than the exception.

Let us live into the power of believing that God called life from death, that we might continue that work in the world. Thanks be to God, amen.

Imagine, if you will, looking down onto this planet Earth we inhabit, as you travel around it 4,576 times. Two astronauts, Suni Williams and Butch

Wilmore, launched for an 8-day space trip...that stretched to 9 months. Happily for everyone who gathered around that space capsule when it landed in the Gulf of Mexico near Florida, they were greeted by a curious pod of dolphins! And <u>all</u> God's creatures said, "Wow!".



This story is not yet finished. It does show the science and engineering it took to both launch and retrieve the astronauts, but we will be eager to see them both up and moving about after experiencing gravity again, and there will be interviews to see and hear. A previous astronaut said that it takes a few days before you don't expect to float out of bed upon awakening. He said even a pen feels heavy after being weightless for a while.

Our stories are not yet finished either. Our Lesson 8 focused on each generation's place in history, caught between past and future, and that "our relationships to the past and future are fundamentally distinct." <> Session Summary <>

The Session of FPC held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 18th at 7:00, p.m. The meeting was opened with prayer and for the devotional, the elders were invited to engage with the prayer stations set up in the M & M Café by the Worship Council.

Action Items included the following:

The Finance Council requested approval of a second phase of the original "A Place For All" Capital campaign. The motion carried unanimously. As shared at the Annual Meeting in January, paying off the debt will save the church \$30,000 in interest expenses.

The Connections Council requested the approval of additional funding. The Council brought a sample of a "Welcome Bag" which could be given to visitors. The bag would contain information about the church, a magnet, some candies and a wooden spoon (produced by Holland Bowl Mill) with the

inscription: First Presbyterian Church on one side, and "Serve with Us" on the other. The motion was approved. The Finance Council will work on securing funding.

Buildings Council shared information about upcoming upgrades to the sanctuary lighting system. As there is sufficient funding due to a significant gift to the church, the council will move ahead with this necessary work.

Council reports included Connections council's great response to monthly Wednesday night dinners for young families, and the excitement of welcoming new families.

Several councils could use additional members and were encouraged to reach out to congregation members with an invitation to participate.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

Deacons <>

There are many ways to get involved serving our congregation through the Deacon care teams, using your gifts to care for each other and strengthen our community. Current ministries coordinated by the deacons include:

Visitation: homebound members and those living in nursing homes can be assigned to a visitor from the congregation who will visit about once a month. These visits are a delightful way to connect with our friends who can no longer make it to church regularly. We also have visitors who sign up to visit folks during hospitalizations or grieving to provide extra support.

Cards: The card team receives regular emails when there are special needs in our congregation so that we can express support, care, joy, and celebration.

Meals: The Nourishers team receives invitations to provide meals for families after surgeries, hospitalizations, births, etc.

Transportation: The Transporters team provides rides to medical appointments for folks who are unable to drive.

Handy Workers: The handy worker team provides light home repairs or other practical needs around the home.

Care Closet: Deacons maintain a list of durable medical equipment available to borrow from members of our congregation and connect folks with items as needed.

Home Communion: Any member who has been previously ordained as an elder or deacon can be part of our home communion program. We bring communion to homebound folks as an extension of our celebration of the Lord's Supper in worship on the first Sunday of the month. Teams of at least 2 elders or deacons serve communion to those who request.
