Looking towards Pentecost

As we look towards Pentecost (June 8th) and listen again to the story of the day that God's Spirit emboldened uncertain disciples to go back out into the world with the news of God's expansive welcome, I pray we will also be emboldened.

I pray we will be emboldened to ask questions of ourselves and of one another.

Let us challenge ourselves with the truth that there is always more we can learn about our faith, about scripture, about God. Let us gather on Sundays with expectation, asking, "What will God do in our midst today?"

How is God calling us to be a witness in our communities?

How is God calling us to be *in* the world but not *of* the world?

That day of Pentecost, people were gathered from a myriad of places; they spoke a diversity of languages. In that diversity, God rejoiced. It was just as God had dreamed at creation. Within the diversity, there was the unity of the Spirit. God's Spirit was calling them together in joy, in companionship, in faithfulness.

Pentecost is still unfolding around us. The disciples were accused of looking foolish (even drunk!) on that first Pentecost celebration. Let us not be afraid to make ourselves foolish for God as well. Let us love this world around us with expansive joy.

Courage to Pray

A few weeks ago, I sang the song, *Plowshare Prayer* by Spencer LaJoye. Several of you asked for the lyrics. They are printed on page 9. I would encourage you to listen to Spencer singing it, if you haven't already done so. To hear Spencer, copy and paste this url into your browser: (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=MhOZv5i7CHY).

This song doesn't sound like the kinds of songs we usually sing on Sunday mornings. It is not theologically dense. The melody isn't particularly sweeping. Instead, it sows something smaller—something softer, yet deeply sacred: a prayer in the language of weariness and hope. The lyrics are raw and tender—maybe less polished than what we might expect in a worship service, but this is why they ring so true. They are prayers forged in real life—in the trenches of grief, anger, doubt and vulnerability. The song invites us to bring our whole selves to God—even if our whole selves are broken into pieces.

This song gives us a way to pray that feels real. It feels authentic. The prayer doesn't rush to resolution. It dwells in the tension. The end of the song doesn't even resolve—it is left hanging asking us to imagine how we might faithfully move forward.

May we all have the courage to pray like this—not just in song, but in the way we live.

After a 6-month trial period, Paul has determined that he would like to take over the music leadership on an ongoing basis. This is wonderful news for our church family. Now it's up to Personnel to formalize this added responsibility.



Absorbing the role of music leadership not only expands the scope of Pastor Paul's current position; but also adds to Pastor Cathy's position as she covers some of the responsibilities Paul has had in the past. In light of these changes, the Personnel Council is supplementing both Cathy's and Paul's income using previously approved funds to support this endeavor.

Deacons <>

There are many ways to get involved serving our congregation through the Deacon care teams, using your gifts to care for each other and strengthen our community. Current ministries coordinated by the deacons include:

Visitation: homebound members and those living in nursing homes can be assigned to a visitor from the congregation who will visit about once a month. These visits are a delightful way to connect with our friends who can no longer make it to church regularly. We also have visitors who sign up to visit folks during hospitalizations or grieving to provide extra support.

Cards: The card team receives regular emails when there are special needs in our congregation so that we can express support, care, joy, and celebration.

Meals: The Nourishers team receives invitations to provide meals for families after surgeries, hospitalizations, births, etc.

Transportation: The Transporters team provides rides to medical appointments for folks who are unable to drive.

Handy Workers: The handy worker team provides light home repairs or other practical needs around the home.

Care Closet: Deacons maintain a list of durable medical equipment available to borrow from members of our congregation and connect folks with items as needed.

Home Communion: Any member who has been previously ordained as an elder or deacon can be part of our home communion program. We bring communion to homebound folks as an extension of our celebration of the Lord's Supper in worship on the first Sunday of the month. Teams of at least 2 elders or deacons serve communion to those who request.
