These various choices – are they a reflection of the residents' favorite holiday?

Is Thanksgiving skipped because of our late realizations that its origins are embedded in racism and violence towards indigenous peoples?

Or is a home that has known religious trauma, and so the idea of a baby born to a virgin, coming to undo all the world's injustices is just a step too far. Santa, sure, but a baby redeemer?

So many possibilities behind the lights and wreaths and pumpkins. So many stories to be shared. A reflection of our varied experiences, the different paths we have known, the choices we have made. As a new church year begins on November 30th, the first Sunday of Advent, could we all seek to listen more deeply to one another (our neighbors, our colleagues, the clerk at the register?) To listen to one another's stories so that we might have deeper understanding of each one's struggles, sorrows and joys? In a deeply divided world, let us do whatever we can to find commonality, to strengthen our commitment to compassion, for they will know we are Christ followers by our love.

This past month we had our first (at least since I have been here) Hymn Sing Service. It was a lot of fun, but harder to plan than you would think! 69 hymns were suggested—many of them more than once—and narrowing them down was no small task, but it was a lot of fun!

As I looked through the list, a few things stood out:

Lots of old favorites.

Classics like *Great Is Thy Faithfulness*, *Amazing Grace*, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, and *Morning Has Broken* continue to be dearly loved. These songs are part of the soundtrack of our faith, and it shows.

Some newer selections, too.

It was great to see hymns from the last few decades—pieces like *Christ, Be Our Light*, *Let Us Build a House*, and *Spirit, Open My Heart*. (“Newer” meaning the mid-1990s—practically yesterday in church music time!)

Several hymns I didn’t know that I got to look up!

I like to think that I know most hymns, but there were some surprises on the list. I love that! It reminds me that our congregation’s musical life is wider and richer than any one person’s experience.

Keep suggesting songs.

We can’t sing them all, but I genuinely enjoy hearing the hymns that matter to you. Your suggestions help shape worship in meaningful ways.

A beautiful diversity in our music.

I often tell people that when you come into worship, I hope you get to sing a song you love and that your neighbor gets to sing a song they love (even if it isn’t your personal favorite). Our hymnody holds all of us, together. Thank you for such a wide, joyful, heartfelt set of suggestions. I love singing with all of you!

This is the good works thing I was taught growing up, but I had missed the point. I was going to "get to heaven" in this way. The lightning hit me in that room and it was an undoing about understanding my faith. Yes, I continue being kind, helpful, engaged, vocal; but life is more meaningful when we can sing Melvina Reynolds song "Love is Something if you Give It Away". Kind of like Jesus preached about who is our neighbor.

<> Deacon's Caring Corner <>

There are many ways to get involved serving our congregation through the Deacon care teams, using your gifts to care for each other and strengthen our community. Current ministries coordinated by the deacons include:

Visitation: homebound members and those living in nursing homes can be assigned to a visitor from the congregation who will visit about once a month. These visits are a delightful way to connect with our friends who can no longer make it to church regularly. We also have visitors who sign up to visit folks during hospitalizations or grieving to provide extra support.

Cards: The card team receives regular emails when there are special needs in our congregation so that we can express support, care, joy, and celebration.

Meals: The Nourishers team receives invitations to provide meals for families after surgeries, hospitalizations, births, etc.

Transportation: The Transporters team provides rides to medical appointments for folks who are unable to drive.

Handy Workers: The handy worker team provides light home repairs or other practical needs around the home.

Care Closet: Deacons maintain a list of durable medical equipment available to borrow from members of our congregation and connect folks with items as needed.



Home Communion: Any member who has been previously ordained as an elder or deacon can be part of our home communion program. We bring communion to homebound folks as an extension of our celebration of the Lord's Supper in worship on the first Sunday of the month. Teams of at least 2 elders or deacons serve communion to those who request.

<> Outreach <>



Mission: Nestlings Diaper Bank nurtures the health of babies by partnering with family support organizations to bridge the gap in diaper need. Diaper need is defined as a lack of sufficient diapers to keep a child clean, dry, and healthy.

>**Prevalence:** Over 1 in 2 families struggle with diaper need.

>**Assistance Gap:** There are currently no government programs that provide assistance for diapers.

>**Consequences:** Families are forced to stretch diaper use, leading to increased health and physical abuse risks and negative effects on brain development in children under the age of three.

Impact and Reach: Since its founding in 2011, Nestlings has distributed over 3,000,000 diapers locally.

> **They provide** a monthly average of over 35,000 free diapers and baby wipes.

> **These supplies** are distributed to over 37 social service agencies in the community that work with families in need.

How to Help Nestlings runs diaper drives and fundraisers year-round and accepts donations of both supplies and money:

> **Diaper Donations:** They accept all diaper donations, including open packages. The most needed sizes are 4, 5, and 6, as well as baby wipes.

> **Monetary Donations:** These are appreciated because the bank can purchase diapers at less than retail cost. **Monetary donations** can be made directly on their website:

<> Session Report <>

The Session of FPC held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 18th at 7:00 pm.

Elders present: Carleen Bauer, Cassie Kregger, Jen Laux Ludwig, Tom Salley, Tim Staal, Lauren Stouffer, Chris Urbanik. Elders excused: Bill Evenson, Jon Kreple, Bruce Rosensteel. Staff: Cathy Hoop, Paul Van Kempen, Lori Klinesteker. Guest: Luke Rund-Scott (youth elder nominee)

After a time of sharing of joys and concerns, the meeting was opened in prayer by Cathy and Paul.

Councils gave updates on their work, including the Finance Council's work on the budget, which will be presented next month. (As Bob Knittel completes his role as treasurer, he is continuing to transition Rob Colten to this position.) The church's finances are healthy and stable, and the hope is to complete the capital campaign in the coming year.

Outreach Council provided an update on the request from FUMC to serve as overflow warming center space for a family during the winter months. FUMC operates a warming center on nights when the temp

(with windchill) is 10 or below. Very rarely, they have a family with children who have not been able to secure a space in a shelter, and FUMC needs a place where they can be housed separately from the guests who come to their church. A dozen people from FPC attended a training at FUMC to learn more about how their warming center is run, to learn from mental health professionals about the various mental health issues that may be encountered when volunteering (Anxiety, PTSD, etc.) and to receive practical advice. Cathy and Tim Staal will continue to meet with representatives from FUMC regarding this initiative.

The Nominating Committee brought forward a recommendation to hold a congregational meeting on December 7th, at which time they will bring forward the nominees for elder, deacon, and the nominating committee.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer.

The next meeting will take place on December 16th.
